Toronto, Ont., May 28.—A despatch to the World from Niagara Falls, Ont., says: "Because Miss Lillian Jackson, teacher in Simcoe street public school, whipped Hugh, the eleven-year-old son of H. M. Wilson, superintendent of the Ontario Power Company, when he refused to sing 'God Save the King,' the Wilson family took the boy out of school and will send him to the American side for his education, so it was learned last night. Young Wilson, whose parents are Southerners, refused point blank to sing the National Anthem, and received a strapping at the hands of the teacher. When he went home he told his parents. CHEAPER LIGHT AND POWER IN WEST FROM MUNICIPAL PLANT
