TURKEY SEIZES OPPORTUNITY TO GRASP TERRITORY

Greeks and Bulgars Both Claim Victories — Reports of Bulgarian Atrocities Confirmed

Constantinople, July 9.—The reply of Bulgaria to the request of the sublime porte agreeing to evacuate the Marmora coast, intimates that the Bulgarian delegate M. Natchovitch, ex-foreign minister, who arrived at Thessalonica today, is empowered to negotiate a settlement of the Marmora question.

In the meantime the porte without waiting for this settlement, has determined immediately to proceed with the military occupation of all the territory up to the Enos-Midia line, in accordance with the peace protocol signed at London. The bustle of military preparations here forcibly reminds one of the state of affairs last autumn.

Athens, July 9.—An official bulletin issued tonight says the Greeks on Tuesday attacked the mountain passes towards Strumitza. The Bulgarians reinforced, perhaps from Istip, offered vigorous resistance, but were steadily driven back.

Sofia, July 9.—Semi-official reports today represent the Bulgarians as successful throughout the fighting line. All the Serbian attacks from Sultantepe to Paritza, according to these reports, were repulsed, the Serbians suffering enormous losses and retreating in the direction of Palanka pursued by the Bulgarians.

London, July 10.—A correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, who arrived at Nigrita Saturday morning, describes the town as a reeking heap of smoldering ruins and confirms the reports of wholesale murders and burning committed by the Bulgarians in all the villages around, as well as Nigrita. He estimates that 1,500 persons have been killed in this manner.

MORNING NEWS FROM THE WIRES

David Howe, chief engineer of the steamer Bruce, died yesterday while the boat was on her way to North Sydney from Port Aux Basques. Death occurred very suddenly.

It is said at Ottawa that the cares of office are beginning to tell heavily upon some of the prominent Conservative leaders and they have sought repose from the clamors of office hunters and protest-makers in different parts of Europe and Canada. Finance Minister White is in England, Sir Richard McBride is going there next month, while Premier Borden is resting in Nova Scotia.

President Thomas Shaughnessy of the C. P. R. who asked yesterday in Montreal concerning a contemplated issue of new stock by that company said there was no truth in the report.

There will be a ten thousand dollar exhibit of Canadian food fish this year at Toronto exhibition, by the dominion government. The display will be the first of its kind ever attempted in Canada.

The whaler "Diana" arrived at Sydney yesterday with the Crocker land expedition after a run of 71½ hours from Boston.

Tenders will be called at Ottawa soon for the increasing of the capacity of the Ottawa branch of the Royal mint to take care of the larger amount of Canadian gold being submitted to the refining process each year.

The verdict of the coroner's jury in the case of Harley Dunlap, who was killed yesterday in a Woodstock mill, was that his death was accidental, but they recommended that the attention of the factory inspector be called to the open and dangerous condition of the mill.

About five hundred former residents of New Brunswick attended the picnic given by the N. B. Association of B. C. at Second Beach, B. C., on July 1. Colonel Sam Hughes and General Sir Ian Hamilton were in Sydney yesterday, and after spending part of the day there went to Halifax, arriving there at 11 o'clock last night. In Sydney they examined the various military properties, and inspected the Sydney battery, C. F. A. The minister intimated that new armory might be provided.

LOCAL CARPENTERS DEMAND RECALL OF HON. MR. COCHRANE

Local Union 919, United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, last evening, endorsed the action of the Ontario provincial conference, at Brantford, June 30, of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, in demanding the recall of Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways.

Local Union 919 met last evening in regular session and the following resolution was drawn up and unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That the local union endorse the action taken by our brother members in Ontario asking for the recall of Honorable Frank Cochrane, minister of railways. Be it further resolved, That a copy of this resolution be submitted to Premier Borden, Hon. J. D. Hazen and Hon. William Fugatey. Be it further resolved, That a copy of this resolution be presented to the provincial conference of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, at Brantford, read as follows:

"Whereas, The efforts of our organization in having the wages of the government employees in the gate yards of the railway companies reduced to the standard of the district; and

"And, Whereas the same reflects upon the honor of the dominion government, who prefer to enforce their wage conditions on all work and supplies; be it

"Resolved, That we, the Ontario Provincial Conference assembled at Brantford, representing over 100,000 carpenters, call upon the premier to remove from his position the Hon. Frank Cochrane, and appoint as minister of railways and canals a man who will act in harmony with this policy of the government and in sympathy with the workmen; and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the premier and to the press."

MELROSE INFANT IS SHOT BY 11-YEAR-OLD BROTHER

Bullet From Revolver Catches into Little One's Skull

Melrose, July 9.—Norman Le Fave, a seven-month-old baby, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Le Fave, was shot and fatally wounded at his home, 22 Weverly place by his 11-year-old brother, Burnes E. LeFave. A bullet from a .38-calibre revolver pierced the baby's skull and little hope of recovery was held.

It is supposed that the older boy found the revolver in a drawer in his father's room, and that while playing with it the trigger was pulled and the ball entered the infant's head. The children's mother heard the report of the shot, and rushing into the room found the baby on the floor with blood streaming from his head. She quickly summoned neighbors, who in turn called a doctor, and the child was taken to the Melrose Hospital in the police ambulance.

HOW FRIEDMANN'S SERUM IS PREPARED

New York, July 9.—Dr. George Rambo, of New York city, medical director of the institute operating on the Friedmann process for the treatment of tuberculosis, announced today that the "vaccine consists of a homogeneous emulsion of live avirulent tuberculosis bacilli, in sterile distilled water."

"The germ was isolated several years ago from a turtle and maintained ever since by transplantation on culture media, according to the usual procedure. The vaccine is administered to patients in doses of from cubic centimetres 0.10 to cubic centimetres 0.80 at intervals of from four to six weeks. Injections are made intravenously in the case of joint tuberculosis and intramuscularly in the case of lung tuberculosis."

He said: "Any physician in good standing is welcome to familiarize himself at the various laboratories where the vaccine is prepared, with the details concerning the administration of the treatment that he may be able to use it personally on his own patients."

Daily Hints For the Cook

TURKISH DELIGHT
One package gelatine, soaked in one cup of lukewarm water. Add the dissolved gelatine to four cups sugar and half cup water, and boil ten minutes. Add nine tablespoons orange juice and five tablespoons lemon juice, and the grated rind of one orange. Cook ten minutes longer, add one cup chopped walnut meat, pour into buttered pan and let stand over night. Cut into squares and roll in powdered sugar.

STRAWBERRY FRITTERS
One cup mashed strawberries, three beaten eggs, one tablespoon sugar, one cup flour, one teaspoon baking powder. Add more flour if needed to make batter stiff enough. Drop by spoon into very hot fat and fry like doughnuts. Serve with mashed sweetened strawberries.
