## MR. CLARK NO LONGER WITH THE HIGHWAY ASSOCIATION

Declared a Self-Styled Dominion Organizer—Asked to Cease Activities

The following is sent out by the Canadian Highway Commission:

Winnipeg, Oct. 11. Mr. Maxwell Clark, who has been in the city for several weeks, representing himself as a Dominion organizer for the Canadian Highway Association, has no connection with that body, according to a statement made at a meeting of the Manitoba Good Roads Association by W. J. Kerr, president of the Canadian Highway Association.

Members have been secured by Mr. Clark, not only in Winnipeg, but in many other cities from Halifax to the Pacific Coast, by advancing the argument that he was working in the interest of the Canadian Highway Association, although his connection ceased on January 3, 1912, as was proved by a statement signed by him and read at that meeting.

Mr. Clark was present at the gathering and was given an opportunity to present his side of the argument. After listening patiently to his explanation Mr. Clark was advised to cease from his activities and warned that his presence would not be tolerated at the Canadian Highway Association's convention here this week.

In the opinion of several who have in the past come in contact with Clark, his interest in the cause of good roads has become an obsession and it was considered inadvisable to publicly repudiate the self-styled Dominion organizer.

While acting as an unauthorized organizer Mr. Clark has done a great deal to prejudice the cause of the Highway Association in many quarters, and has, because of his high quarters, created antagonism to the initiative of the Manitoba Good Roads Association, which has been hindered because Clark had drafted a programme for the fourth year. He had two speakers for the fourth year.

## RECENT DEATHS

General regret will be felt because of the death of Edward P. Morgan which took place about three o'clock yesterday afternoon at the residence of his father, James Morgan, 63 Main street. Mr. Morgan was in his twenty-first year, was a young man of great promise, and had a host of friends in the city. Prior to his illness he was in the employ of Mr. A. A. Led. He was a member of the St. John Council of the Knights of Columbus, and also of the St. Peter's Y. M. C. A. and the St. Peter's orchestra. He was well liked by all with whom he came in contact.

Besides his father he leaves one brother, Othello, of Toronto, one sister, Mrs. F. O'Brien, of St. John, and a large number of other relatives in the city. His family will have the sympathy of a large circle of friends. The funeral will take place on Monday.

Yesterday in the General Public Hospital, Miss Gertrude Joyce, daughter of Martin Joyce, of Clarendon street, died in the 14th year of her age. Many friends will hear of her death with regret.

Mrs. Mary Collins, widow of Doctor Patrick Collins who was the ship's physician in attendance on the cholera cases at Partridge Island, in 1846, and who, contracting the disease there, and died of it, passed away in Chipman memorial hospital St. Stephen on Thursday evening aged 92 years. Mrs. Collins' husband died in the first year of their married life, and she removed to Milford, N. B., where for years she kept house for her brother, the late Father James Quinn. Since his death she had made her home with friends in Milford. Mrs. Collins was highly respected. Rev. Father Doherty, of Toronto, is her only living relative in the country. The funeral will be held on Monday.
