"THE BAD BOY"

Admirable Address by Jacob
Riis in Bangor

NOTED SOCIAL REFORMER

Experience Shows That Question
is Not Why is The Boy Bad,
But is The Boy Bad—Schools
as Social Centres

The following admirable address on
the bad boy, was given in Bangor last
week by Jacob Riis, whom the Canadian
Club here has been endeavoring—so far
unsuccessfully—to bring to St. John to
give an address. The Bangor Commem-
orial says:

Jacob Riis, a noted New York phil-
anthropist and social reformer, addressed
the teachers in City hall on Friday
evening on the bad boy. The hall was
filled to the doors, many standing around
the sides. Mr. Riis' address, sparkling
with wit and good nature, was heard
with deep appreciation.

"Why is the boy bad?" asked Mr.
Riis, and he answered the question with
another "What is he like? Let us have
a look at him." He told of his own in-
roduction to school that made him hate
it ever after and of how the two "bad
boys" in his class, he himself being one,
were discovered at a reunion forty years
after to be the only ones whom the
king had knighted and honored. The
truth was that they were not bad; they
simply didn't fit in. Ever since, he had
been like turning the question around and
asking "Is the boy bad?" And more
than half the time the answer of ex-
perience is "no." Someone else has been
bad, foolish and bad, in not finding out
what was in the lad.

Perhaps he lives in a tenement where
"all the influences make for unrighte-
ousness," and with the gutter for his
playground. Perhaps his school is the
kind that takes account only of the
buildings and the books, the children
the mere frame of the picture. Whom
then is the blame? You cannot make a
whole man out of half a boy. In such an
environment men do not grow.

As Social Centres

Mr. Riis put in a strong plea for the
school as a civic and social centre. The
school belongs to the people, and when
the teacher becomes the neighborhood
center, the social settlement, which is striv-
ing to bring this all out, has done its
greatest work. Neighbor will need
neighbor on his own ground. The town
meeting will have come back in a shape
to suit our present day civilization
which the old one did not and could not.

The boy is all right if given a fair
chance. He joins the gang because we
have him no other club. He breaks the
law because we taught him with our
dead letter laws to despise it. He steals
because a lack and divides squarely with
his pals. He would be good if we gave
him a show. The old school master was
quitting anxiously as to the standard of
degrees of good boys but no bad ones.
There is almost always a misfit in the
series of yanks and then deposited him in
a rule that holds good always. Believe
in him. Take him up, not as a problem
but as a human boy. The world would
have fared ill in all ages but for the
bad boys who kicked over the traces,
didn't fit in and so went out to seek a
place where he did fit in, and broke his
paths on which humanity has tread
in his wake toward a bigger, better
brighter day.
