Therefore, five inches is all that the courses will bear to be laid to the weather with surety of forming a good roof. The over the entire roof. If they are not three thicknesses-if now and then a shingle lacks a quarter of an inch of being long enough to make three thicknesses—there will in all probability be a leak in the roof at such a point. Moreover, when the lower courses lack half an inch of extending up far enough to receive the rain from the outermost course, in case the middle course were removed, it would be just as well to lay them seven or eight inches to the weather as to lay only five or five and a half.
