Codfish.

There is no longer any fear that codfish will drop below \$6.00 in the local market. Last week the indications were that way, but the attempt to drive the price down was local and artificial. The price is much firmer at \$6.00 this week, and we do not think it will go below that figure, even if we get a good report from the Labrador floaters. When fish buying begins in earnest in a few weeks, and competition sets in, we expect to see the price advance to \$6.50.

Cod oil.

Common cod oil got another slump this week, is now down to \$90.00 per ton—a decrease of \$10.00 since our last issue. As against this, the price of refined oil has advanced another peg and is now \$1.00, with a further upward tendency. There is a lively demand in France and England for medicinal cod oil just now, and all who have gone into the business this season, and all who have held on to their product, will be able to market with satisfaction at the close of the season's operations.—Trade Review.

Two Murderers

Kaiser William and Charles Becker issued manifestoes at the close of last week, at about the same time. Barring the fact that justice has been executed upon Becker and not upon the Kaiser, there is a good deal of similarity between the two cases. Both murderers persisted in affirming their total innocence, in face of an overwhelming body of evidence and the consensus of opinion of the impartial world. Both murderers, it is possible, were self-deceived and really believed themselves to be speaking the truth. Some surprise has been expressed at the vigor of Charles Becker's protestations of innocence even when he stood within the shadow of the gallows, and many people have been shaken in their confidence of his guilt. But it must be remembered that Becker did not slay Hermann Rosenthal by a blow with a club, or the thrust of a sword, or the pulling of a trigger—acts about which there could be no two ideas in the mind of the man who performed them. He slew Rosenthal by a conspiracy, by bringing the power of his mind and will to bear upon inferior minds; and it is readily conceivable that he regarded all that he did as being at least "justifiable." He was the product of an immoral "system"—the system of the politically controlled police force which views the enforcement of law as an element of the party struggle. So thoroughly imbued with that conception was he that he evidently regarded his own death, although brought about with all due forms of law and after repeated trials, as a murder personally performed by Governor Whitman. It is interesting to recall that Becker was undoubtedly of German ancestry. Self-delusion, and inability to recognize the claims of impartial justice, are inherent characteristics of the German mind.

Compared with Becker's, even the Kaiser's confidence in his own innocence looks weak. He sounds like a man who is trying to convince himself by reiteration of that which he wishes to believe. "Before God and history my conscience is clear. I did not will the war." This is rather the self-exoneratory language of the haunted murderer than the proud utterance of the innocent. It seems strange that the Kaiser should have felt it necessary to repeat it so earnestly and so formally. Among all the Allied Nations of the Entente the belief in the provocation of Germany and the peacefulness of the Allies has been intense and overwhelming ever since the first few weeks of the war; and the same is true of the neutral countries outside of the German sphere of influence. But apparently the Germans are not so confident of their own rectitude as are we, and our friends about ours; they want to put their ruler on oath every now and again to strengthen their conviction.—Beck's Weekly.

Mum's the Word

"The advantage of a Censorship is that an army can thereby hide its mistakes. Like the case of the general and Aunt Jemima, you know."

The speaker was a well-known general. He continued: "An old lady once died at St. Her nephew and heir ordered the body sent home. But when the young man opened the coffin to have one last look at the remains, he beheld, instead of his beloved Aunt Jemima, the corpse of a general, in full uniform, the breast covered with military medals.
