By Which Mr. Pardo Will Escape an Election Trial.

All the Protests but Eighteen Abandoned by Agreement.

Toronto, June 18.--A conference was held this morning between counsel representing Liberal and Conservative parties respectively and three judges concerning the election petitions to be heard. The judges present were Justices Ross, Ferguson and Oiler. The Conservative counsel were W. D. McPherson, F. Bristol, James Baird and D. W. Smith. The Liberal counsel were R. A. Grant, C. J. Coleman, Geo. Ross, and H. E. Irwin. The solicitors stated that in numerous cases there had not been sufficient time to prepare evidence necessary to proceed with the trial. The result of the conference was that of the 65 petitions entered 18 will go to trial. This number may be increased by one or two additions, but this is not likely. The trials will likely take place during August and September. The judges are expected to be in court on August 1st. The petitions that will go to trial are: Against Liberal members--North Perth, East Lambton, South Lambton, Hallow, West York, East Northumberland, South Perth, Total, 7. Against Conservative members--Centre Simcoe, North Hastings, Dufferin, West Elgin, East Elgin, South Ontario, North Waterloo, North Renfrew, Total, 8.

And the Stakes were Forty Thousand Dollars.

A Tea Train Reached the U. S. Border Just Too Late to Escape the War Duties.

Chicago, June 18.--It has just been learned that the importers of Chicago lost \$40,000 in an exciting race against time and Uncle Sam's war taxes, which had its finish at midnight on Monday on the Canadian border near Port Huron, N. D. A score of carloads of choice tea were being rushed into this country from Canada, in order to escape the new war duty, which fell due June 13 at midnight. Only five carloads arrived on United States soil in time. The other fifteen cars were stalled in British territory a few hundred feet away as the clock struck twelve. They were brought to a standstill by the temporary orders of United States internal revenue officers on the watch at the dividing line between this country and Canada. When a telegram brought the news that the race was lost, there was consternation among the local importers. The excitement was heightened by the absence of opportunity for getting the retail grocer or the public to pay the tax, as the entire consignment had been sold to dealers throughout the west and northwest. The blow falls with full force upon a dozen tea importing firms in this city.

Native Troops are all Deserting General Augusti.

His Family Said to Have Been Made Prisoners by the Insurgents.

London June 18.--The Hong Kong correspondent of the Times says: According to Manila advices, dated June 13 and brought here by H. M. S. Linnet, the rebels have captured the family of Gen. Augusti. In most cases the desertions of the native regiments have been accompanied by a massacre of the officers. It is reported from Shanghai that the Spanish archbishop from Manila has arrived there by the German troop ship Darmstadt. The following dispatch from Manila, signed Capt. Gen. Augusti and dated June 13, is published officially at Madrid: "The grave situation set forth in my dispatch of the 5th continues. The troops are fighting on the line of block-houses which stops the enemy's advance. The enemy has been strengthened by desertions of the native troops, which diminish our means of resistance and may compel me to take refuge within the walled city. "Communication with the province is still cut and I do not know whether the detachments there will be able to hold out against a lack of resources. "I hope to receive assistance from the peninsula before our means of defense are exhausted."

SPANISH ADMIT LOSS.

A Number of Officers and Men Killed at Santiago they Say.

THE DON'S OFFICIAL ACCOUNT OF THE LAST BOMBARDMENT--SOME BATTERIES WERE ALSO DESTROYED.

Havana, June 18.--The following is a Spanish report of the bombardment of Santiago de Cuba: "On June 16, at 5 a. m., fire was opened upon the coast batteries of Santiago de Cuba by four American battleships, two ironclad cruisers and a protected cruiser, while one yacht opened fire opposite Aguadulce beach. The cannonade was violent and fearful, and lasted one hour and a half. The American ships fired over 1,000 projectiles and temporarily disabled two Montoria cannon at La Socapa, covering them with earth. The parapet was destroyed by a shell. One cannon of Morro Castle was damaged by the American projectiles. All the damage was repaired today. The Americans suffered very severe damage. Shells from the Spanish batteries were clearly seen to fall on the American ships, which were approximately two miles off. "The Spanish losses at the Morro were one artillery corporal killed and one second lieutenant, Juan Arbol, eight soldiers and two sailors of the watch service wounded. "At the Socapa battery two artillery sailors were killed and Second Lieut. Ricardo Brugueta, of the navy, and six soldiers were wounded. The Spanish soldiers were unharmed. "General Linarez eulogizes the behaviour of the troops and Capt. Gen. Blanco will reward several officers and soldiers wounded to-day and in the engagement of June 8. He will recommend for special reward Col. Ordonez, of the artillery."

TOOK THE CHURCH

Spaniards held it desperately for Nine Days.

And Then Had to Surrender--Insurgents Control Manila's Water Supply.

Manila, June 11, via Hong Kong, June 17.--The rebel troops who, as I mentioned in my last despatch, were besieging the old Cavite church, kept the Spanish garrisons closely surrounded, but could make little impression on the solid stone wall. The insurgents' battery across the bay had not force for the shells, and their powder was low, consequently the Spaniards were not in much fear of their guns. It was not until the Krupp field pieces were so placed as to make sure of breaking the walls that the Lieutenant-colonel commanding surrendered, on June 9, after having held out for nine days. The rebels captured here 250 men and 270 Mauser rifles. This closed the campaign in Cavite Province, there being no more Spaniards left at large. The whole insurgent force then moved north to attack the Spanish positions outside of Manila city. Continuous fighting has been going on ever since, resulting in the rebels taking the towns of Parkunque and Pany on the coast, and several towns north-east of Manila, which is now surrounded by the insurgents, who press the Spaniards hard, notwithstanding the latter's superior artillery. One day's fighting illustrates all.

This afternoon, apparently in warehouses near the docks, which have been burning for two hours. The rebels have control of the city's water supply, but are not going to cut it off, for fear of exciting indignation and disease if the city should be deprived of water.

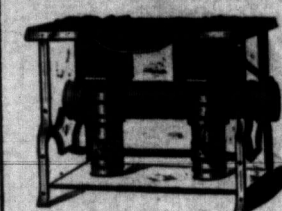
