LOCAL NEWS.

Twenty-two births were recorded in the city during the week, eleven being males. There were six marriages.

The W. C. T. U. will entertain the seamen at the Chipman House tonight at eight o'clock.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Louis Nelson took place at 2.30 this afternoon from her home St. James street. Rev. Dr. Sprague officiated and interment was in Fernhill.

ROY A. Vanwart, son of the late Dr. N. Vanwart, this city, sold all his interests in Missoula, Montana, and removed to Boston, chiefly because of the condition of his health which is said to be precarious. Mr. Vanwart owned several dwellings, bowling alleys, etc., in the far west city.

Thirteen burial permits were issued during the past week by the board of health. The deaths resulted from the following causes:—Heart failure, 2; marasmus, myocarditis, pneumonia, senile decay, diabetes, cancer, suicide, acute pneumonia, tuberculosis and stricture oesophagi one each.

Hum Willie, who for some years has conducted an Oriental store on Hill street, has not gone out of business, but is removing to the Goggin building on Charlotte street, opposite the Dufferin Hotel. He does not intend residing permanently in St. John, but will make his home in Montreal, and will send an assistant here to look after the shop. Hum Willie who came back from Montreal ago a week or so ago says Lee Johnston, who has become a cop, is now doing all right, though at first he had troubles of his own.

Theodore Vanwart, formerly of Indianapolis, but who has been living in Newfoundland for several years, was in the city yesterday enroute to his new home. He has been several weeks visiting in Detroit, Chicago, New York and other cities. Mr. Vanwart, who was engaged with the St. John Railway Co. during the last few years of his residence in St. John, is now enjoying a lucrative position with the Reid interests in Newfoundland as an electrician. Mrs. Vanwart and children, who came home to be present at the anniversary celebration of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Smith, will accompany the ex-citizen back to the island.

The fittings of dry goods buyers and modistes is a forcible reminder indeed that these mountains of snow and pyramids of ice will very soon melt away to budding spring-tides. One of the passengers by today's Empress of Britain was W. G. Smith, chief of M. R. A.'s buying staff. Mr. Smith will spend nearly three months in the British Isles and on the continent. W. L. Robson, of the same house, is now on his way home, and when he arrives in New York will meet Miss Hoyt, head wholesale milliner and Miss McBeath, of the ladies tailoring department in the American style centre.

Last evening at the home of Rev. A. B. Cohen, 10 Waterloo street, a very pleasant social was held, under the management of a committee of ladies whose efforts were directed in the interest of the St. John's Bazaar. The affair was highly enjoyed by over fifty ladies and gentlemen. Novel games and competitions being introduced. A light supper was served before the party disbanded. Throughout the next couple of months similar house entertainments will be held for the same purpose, while other ladies are selling cakes, bread, preserves, and clothes. Iron holders and other household necessities in order to increase their "talent." Last winter a handsome sum was raised by such schemes.

GETTING READY FOR

RUSH WORK IN THE SPRING

Extra Men Engaged to Prepare Cement

Forms for Use in Building the

New I. C. R. Shops.

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 9.—In anticipation of the great rush of work early in the spring twenty-five men have been engaged at the I. C. R.'s new shops for the purpose of constructing cement forms so that the work can be rushed as soon as the snow begins to disappear. Between six and seven hundred men will be engaged at the new shops during the coming season.

The buildings are all constructed of cement and the men who are being engaged now to go to work the first of the week will be put to work constructing cement forms so that there will be no delay when the actual building begins. During the winter some eight men have been employed on the same work, but orders have come from headquarters to increase the number and the building of large temporary carpenter shop was started today. Superintendent of construction, J. R. Nicholls, is at present in Glasgow, Scotland, purchasing steel for the shops. A large force of engineers is to be engaged in the spring and will probably start early in March. H. J. Rogers, Montreal, is in charge at present.

NEWSBOYS HAD THEIR ANNUAL TREAT

Over Four Hundred Skated at Victoria Rink

And Afterwards Enjoyed a Dinner Arranged by a Committee of Ladies.

The St. John newsboys were given rare enjoyment in the Victoria Rink, this morning. The boys assembled at the City road amusement house at 9 o'clock, and from then until twelve they enjoyed skating. At the hour of noon, the boys were called off the ice, not to be sent home, but to be ushered into the ladies' dressing room where a tempting repast was laid before them. The three hours of skating gave an edge to the appetites of the distributors of the daily news, and those in charge found they had done the wise thing in having a large amount of food on hand. The four hundred lads who were present could not be fed at once. Parties of about forty occupied the chairs at the tables, and as soon as the seats were vacated there were many hungry ones waiting to be ushered in. It was two o'clock before all was over, and when the boys left the rink they gave cheer upon cheer for the ladies and gentlemen who were kind enough to carry out the annual treat.

Some of the messengers could not arrange to get away from their work. It has been arranged, however, that they will receive three hours skating whenever they desire.

On Wednesday morning the business to come before the gathering will be completed.

Six or Eight Pretty Residences Will be Added to the Number Now Occupied at This Popular Resort

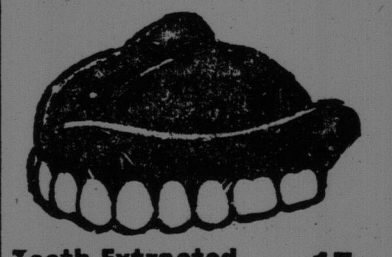
