

MICHELL, B. C.—A fierce gale of wind yesterday fanned the slumbering embers in the forest west of the town into renewed fury causing them to burn worse than ever. They swept on towards the town at terrible, speed and the fate of the new portion of the town, was soon settled. The flames invaded the railway yards where a hundred thousand feet of the mine timber owned by the coal company was soon destroyed as was also considerable rolling stock. The train service will be blocked indefinitely. All the flat back of the Great Northern depot became a seething mass of flames.

The Murchie fire which threatened to work as far as the cemetery has been burning for several days and was practically extinguished by a crèw of men sent out Friday evening, but the wind of Monday fanned the embers into life and the flames made rapid progress in the general direction of the river, sending up clouds of smoke which gave residents of the city proper the impression that a serious conflagration was in progress and that there was danger to farm property along the river road.
