## DIVORCE TOO EASY, SAYS DR. LEFROY

LONDON, Aug. 23—The Standard published an article by the late Dr. Lefroy, Dean of Norwich, on the "Loosening of the Marriage Bond." Pathetic interest attaches to this article, as Dr. Lefroy died recently in Switzerland, and it is believed to be his last piece of literary work.

Divorce was a subject on which Dr. Lefroy felt strongly, and he expresses in his article strong condemnation of a practice which is increasing so greatly. Dr. Lefroy points out that in England, since 1857, up to which time divorce was the dangerous privilege of the opulent, divorce has become scandalously common.

"The statistics," he says, "are more than alarming. They present a state of things in the moral life of England which had no parallel in its history for centuries up to 1857. In America and in the United States, there are twelve million marriages annually. Of these one million end in divorce every year. The curse of the facility of divorce is like a social corrosive that is eating into the moral sense of the whole nation, and it may be taken as proved that the greater the facilities given for divorce the lighter will be the sense of the solemnity of the marriage bond.

Ralph De Palma, in a Fiat, was second, and Stillman in a Marmon was third. The race will be declared no contast and the Indianapolis motor speedway trophy will be raced for again.

By a strange freak of fortune, Merzescaped from the terrible wreck with hardly a scratch. He fell under the car when it turned a somersault through the air and came down into a gulley near the side of the track. He was in imminent danger of being burned to death, but by extraordinary work he was able to shut off the engine and save bimself. Kellum was hurled into a gully some distance away.

On Thursday Elmer Grampton, a six-year-old boy, was killed by the automobile of Dr. Clarke E. Day of this city, while the latter was on his way to the speedway for the first day's races. Tonight a pall of grief hangs over the city and the more reckless automobilists drive more carefully through the streets than they did earlier in the week.
