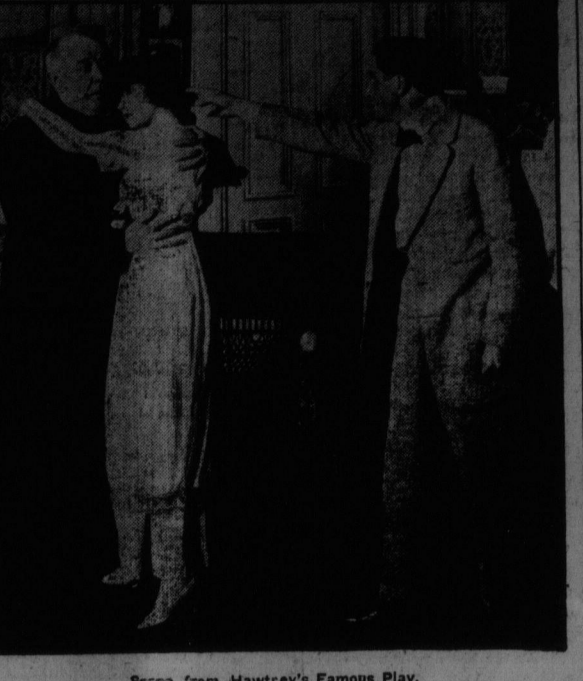

INTERCOLONIAL ESTIMATES DISCUSSED IN PARLIAMENT

Hon. Mr. Cochrane Promises that the Rolling Stock of the I. C. R. will be Improved at Once—Premier's Promises Regarding Branch Lines will be Carried Out.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Mar. 20.—The intercolonial estimates, were taken up this afternoon and evening. Before the Speaker left the chair, Mr. Emmerson addressed the House for 75 minutes on the intercolonial question and Mr. Cochrane replied in five minutes.

Mr. Cochrane said that the railway under one man instead of three, argued that the road should not be expected to pay, complained of the condition of the roadbed and motive power and suggested that a steamship line might supplement the railway.

Mr. Graham suggested the double tracking of the line. He expressed the view that ultimately Halifax would be used for passenger and St. John for freight traffic.

A. K. MacLean asked if the mechanical workshops would be re-established at Halifax. "It has been under consideration," said Mr. Cochrane.

The motion shops were discussed. Mr. Cochrane saying that the rolling stock first must be put in proper shape. The plant would be worked to its full capacity in repairing rather than in building new stock. Until the rolling stock is in good shape new cars may be bought.

Question of Running Rights. "The question of running rights has not yet been considered at all. The only corporation that has applied for running rights is the C. P. R., and their application was in regard to that portion of the railway between St. John and Halifax. This is a matter that will also receive the attention of the government as soon as this session is over.

"The Hon. gentleman (Mr. Emmerson) also spoke about special conductors. I have put on some special conductors for the collecting of tickets on the section of the railway."

Mr. Cochrane—"I do not know where they have been taken from. I left the selection to the auditor of the department to choose the men that were recommended to me when I assumed charge of the department. I only want to make a trial of the system in order to demonstrate its merits. I know that several American roads have adopted the system and I understand have spoken very favorably of it."

"As to the surplus, I think when the supplementary estimates come down."

Mr. Carvell—"The surplus will be all gone."

Mr. Cochrane—"There will be a vote in regard to rolling stock in respect to the condition of the rolling stock, I have heard a great deal which corroborates several of the Hon. gentleman's (Mr. Emmerson's) statements, but I have not seen able to speak definitely as to that. However, I am having a report made in regard to the rolling stock. A shortage of cars, I am sorry to say has been experienced on all roads. That matter was brought to the attention of the House about a month ago, the complaint then being made of the C. P. R. It was said that people between here and Pembroke could not get cars to ship their hay. I took the matter up with the C. P. R. at the time and they informed me that they had over 15,000 cars in the United States and it was impossible to get them back. I was informed that the

BRITAIN LAUNCHES LARGEST WARSHIP; COST 10,000,000

London, Mar. 20.—The Queen Mary, Great Britain's twenty-fifth Dreadnought, was launched today at Jarrow in the presence of thousands of spectators.

The new battle cruiser is of the same type as the cruiser Lion, which was launched in August, 1910, but she has a greater displacement and horsepower which are given as 27,000 tons and 75,000 indicated horsepower respectively.

The Queen Mary is the largest warship yet built and her total cost amounts to \$10,395,320.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, may contract a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must first appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district.

Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$30 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent). Price \$30 per acre. Duties—Must be paid in three equal parts of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
