

BERLIN HEARS REORGANIZATION OF GOVERNMENT

Germany and Russia to be
Put on More Homogeneous
Basis.

Berlin, Sept. 25.—Political Berlin is in a flutter over an approaching reorganization of the German and Prussian Governments on a broad homogeneous basis.

A sharp tactical turn to the right made by the Social Democratic Party still Germany's numerically strongest party—at the Goerlitz convention, an overwhelming four-fifths majority vote, makes it practically certain that the German People's Party will enter Germany's present coalition Government and that the Social Democrats will re-enter both the German and Prussian Governments.

Hence, composed of the German People's Party, the Democratic Party, the Catholic Centre Party and the Social Democratic Party, the Government of the Republic will be established on the broadest parliamentary basis since the outbreak of the revolution, leaving the extreme reactionaries and radicals—to win, the German National Party and the Independent Socialist Party—out in the cold of a weakened opposition with the dwindling Communists a negligible quantity. This development is very important as regards both its inner political and foreign political consequences.

So far the leaders of the respective coalition parties have not engaged in formal negotiations regarding the make-up of the coming new Cabinets and it is likely that these will not be formed till after the Reichstag and Prussian Diet reassemble, but already political circles are speculating on the personal changes in the Cabinets.

It is predicted in some quarters that Chancellor Wirth will go. It is argued that he made an irretrievable political faux pas by publishing the sensational Weissmann report aimed at Bavaria, which subsequently proved to contain material more than a year old.

If Wirth falls, it will be more likely due to the fact that he like his murdered friend, Erzberger, enjoyed the support of the radical Left wing of the Centre Party, in which both were leaders, and that his further strength was derived from the tacit confidence and benevolent neutrality of the Independent Socialist Party, which, though not in the Government, was willing to support him in his sharp fight against capital and property interests in connection with the new tax programme coming before the Reichstag next session.

The impending entry of the German People's Party into the coalition, and the switch to the Right by the Majority Socialists, will give a decidedly reactionary complexion to Germany's next government, and it weakens correspondingly Wirth's position as radical leader.

Rich Silver Ore Discovered

Prince Rupert, B. C., Sept. 25.—Discovery of rich silver ore on the Kildale River, Alice Arm district, in claims close to the famous Dolly Varden mine, is reported here. Three general samples taken from the mine show an average more than 100 ounces to the ton, and the body of ore of this richness is said to be very extensive. It has an average width of 25 inches and adjoins lower grade ore, which carries good milling values.

Centenarian Still Enjoying Life

Never Been Ill and Believes in
the Open Air Existence for
Longevity.

Alexander, Man., Sept. 25.—Still able to take long strolls along the country roads and to visit neighbors for little chats on old times, John McLeod, a resident of this town since 1905, celebrated his 100th birthday recently. Mr. McLeod was never seriously ill in his life and firmly believes that the open air existence he led since he was a child, greatly contributed to his health and consequent ripe and sound old age.

He is one of the very rare Cana-

dian-born centenarians. Mr. McLeod was born on Sept. 16, 1821, at a little settlement called Barney's River, in Nova Scotia. He was raised on the farm and when old enough started farming on his own account at Avondale, N. S.

The centenarian comes from a healthy old stock, his mother living until she was 80 years of age. Two of his sisters are still living, one of them resides at Gloucester, C. B., and is in her 85th year, while another, a resident of Providence, R. I., is 97 years old.

To guard two grammes of radium worth \$154,000, owned by the city of Philadelphia, a specially built double steel safe, 30 inches square, is being erected. The stronghold will cost \$75,000. The presence of three men holding three different secret combinations will be required to accomplish the lawful opening of the radium safe.

France Awaiting U. S. Withdrawal

Forces on Rhine Reduced to
35,000, But Surplus Kept
Intact.

Paris, Sept. 24.—The French War Office has announced that France's contingent on the Rhine has been reduced to 35,000 officers and men, all the forces sent to the Ruhr border several months ago, when an advance was thought probable within 48 hours' notice, having been withdrawn to garrisons in Alsace and Lorraine. These forces will be kept intact, however, for any emergency which may develop, such as the withdrawal of the American Army of Occupation from

Coblenz, which officials here are convinced is only a matter of a few weeks.

It is understood that France has reached an agreement with Belgium whereby the French will occupy Coblenz if the Americans withdraw from there.

It is announced that a conference to study the question of the cost of the armies of occupation in the Rhineland will meet in Brussels from October 15 to October 25. The United States, it is understood, will be represented.

The British already are manifesting an unwillingness to extend their occupation zone, owing to the necessity of troop withdrawals in the last few months, several British battalions having been needed for service in Ireland and to guard factories in Great Britain during labor strikes. The British contingent on the Rhine is now officially estimated at 4,000 effectives, as compared with 8,000 in the American area of occupation.

National Principles Laid Down By Vets.

Setting Forth Programme to
be Followed in Forthcom-
ing Federal Election.

Winnipeg, Sept. 25.—Recommendations for consideration at the Port Arthur convention of a clearly defined set of principles laid down as a national policy for the Great War Veterans' Association in the approaching federal election are made to the Dominion command in a resolution passed by the provincial executive of the Manitoba command.

The resolution reaffirms local autonomy of branches in political matters, urges an intelligent interest in such matters and support of soldier

candidates pledged to uphold just legislation. Members of local branches are urged to approach all candidates in their constituency and acquaint them with the policy of the association as laid down by the Dominion command and to obtain their support to its defined principles.
