A special meeting of the board of trade was held Thursday evening, President George Schell presiding. The chair. There was a large attendance.
A letter from W. S. Loggie, M. P., stating that he had called the attention of the government to the fact that the railway was referred to by him by the board, was read. After discussion by several members the following resolution was moved by James Nicol:
Whereas, the town of Chatham is under the great disadvantage of having the railway station about one mile distant from the business portion of the town, and siting a long truckage for freight, and considerable inconvenience to the traveling public; and
Whereas, there exists at the west end of the town a large tract of many suitable sites for various industries owing to the fact that the water is deep along this shore, and it requires only the proximity of the railway to cause these properties to be sought after by manufacturers, and thereby bring increased traffic to the railway;
Therefore resolved, that the federal government be memorialized to divert the track of the Fredericton section of the Intercolonial, at a point west of the present station, to cause the station to be brought to the river bank to allow of short sidings to be made to points along the river bank, where they may in future be taken for many purposes, and thence to some location in the town more suitable than the present railway station built thereon.
It was moved by George Watt that James Nicol and M. S. Hocken act in conjunction with the town council committee in preparing and forwarding a memorial on the subject.
Robert Murray moved that separate memorials be prepared and sent. Carried.
James Nicol moved that G. Watt and M. S. Hocken prepare and forward a memorial to the government to build an armory in Chatham. Carried.
George E. Fisher, W. P. Cassidy, Charles Robinson and J. Y. Meserve were elected members of the board.
A letter from A. G. Williston, of Hardwicke, was enclosed.
To the Hon. James Sutherland, Minister of Public Works, Ottawa, Canada:
Gentlemen:
We the undersigned electors and ratepayers of the parish of Hardwicke, of the county of Northumberland, province of New Brunswick, respectfully draw your attention to the following facts:
That the residents living in the vicinity of and around the middle and lower Bay du Vin are entirely without a wharf at which to land their supplies by steamer or vessel.
That the lower bay is distant from Bay du Vin wharf some miles; that the Bay du Vin wharf is the only wharf east of Logville on the south side of the Miramichi river; that the distance between the wharf at Logville and the wharf at Bay du Vin is eight miles, which distance is composed of some of the best farming land in the province, these bays being the location of one of the most important oyster beds in New Brunswick, as well as being a rich fishing ground for salmon and bass.
That the present lack of shipping facilities is a great source of expense, annoyance and loss to dealers who handle these fish.
That a wharf situated near Mill's Point would accommodate both upper and lower Bay du Vin bays, as well as be a conven-

Fredericton, Feb. 16.—(Special)—Annie May Waters, colored girl, aged nineteen, is in custody here on a charge of breaking and entering the residence of Gilbert W. Dykeman and stealing therefrom \$2.75 in value of goods. The robbery was committed between 7 and 8 o'clock last evening during the temporary absence of Mrs. Dykeman at a neighbor's home.
Dykeman locked the door when she left and was absent about an hour. When she returned she heard somebody open and shut the back door. She made an investigation and found that her back room and several rooms had been ransacked. She immediately informed Policeman Rideout of her loss, and told him she suspected that a colored girl had committed the robbery, as one had been prowling about the yard on the previous evening.
The officer went straight to the Waters' home in Whitechapel and accused the girl of the robbery. At first she indignantly denied the charge, but a search
