FREDERICTON

Fredrickton, N. B., Oct. 16.—The pedestal of the Burns monument was placed in position today and by tomorrow evening it is expected that the statue will be in place. Everything will be in readiness for the unveiling on Thursday. Governor Fraser, the mayor and the council will arrive tomorrow evening, and the Scotchmen are looking forward to a day long to be remembered.

The receipts from the sale of game licenses this year have already amounted to more than \$20,000 and this will prove a record year for the province. Surveyor General Sweney is in town and has been seen by the returns for the whole of last season, when, according to the blue book, they were \$20,075. As further proof of the exceptionally heavy demand for game licenses this year, Mr. Sweney stated that he had to have printed 1,000 extra licenses over and above the regular supply which was equal to that of last year. Continuing Mr. Sweney said that there were more foreigners in the province this year shooting big game than in any former season. Reports had reached him from officers from game stations that nearly all of the non-resident sportsmen had their moose.

Chairman Allen of the taxation commission said this morning that the commission would make its report to the city council at its November meeting, which comes on the first Tuesday in the month. Just as to what the report would contain Mr. Allen would not say, but he did state that the act would be about eighty sections in length, while the report would be about five or six folios in length. It is believed that the poll tax will be substantially reduced, but that the reduction will not be as heavy as advocated by Mayor Murray. The act seems certain. The mayor and others advocated having the poll tax as low as \$2.00 or \$3; but it is doubtful if the poll tax will be lower than \$4. It is that low. It is also understood that it is the intention of the commission to make church and glebe lands taxable. If such a course is pursued the Church of England would be the heaviest hit, as that church owns a great amount of church and glebe property in the city.
