METAL TRADES EMPLOYEES ENDORSE THE PRINCIPLE

OF COLLECTIVE BARGAINING
AT WINNIPEG, June 16.—The metal trades employees today endorsed the principle of collective bargaining, which is endorsed by the mediation committee of the railroad brotherhood officials as "being in principle and effect the same as that endorsed by these railroad organizations."

MAYOR GRAY IS HOPEFUL

MEDIATION BOARD HAS GIVEN UP
SAYS IT IS THROUGH
WINNIPEG, June 16.—(By J. J. Conklin).—The Mediation Board of railroad running trades has given up its efforts to bring about settlement of the metal trades dispute, and adjourned permanently. "We are through," was the brief announcement of S. E. Barker, chairman of the board. Nothing has been accomplished by the board since the mediator turned down proposals submitted by the board and refused to meet either proposals of metal trades council. Recognition of metal trades council remained the one point which blocked success of negotiations. The employers stood out on the open shop.

OTTAWA, June 16.—Balters on the budget from Western Canada will number exactly a dozen. Opponents to the proposals from Manitoba will include: Hon. T. A. Crerar, F. L. Davis, of Neepawa and J. A. Campbell, of Nelson. From Saskatchewan there will be: Levi Thompson of Qu'Appelle, Thomas McNutt, of Salt Coats, and Rev. Kneel, of Prince Albert. J. F. Johnson, of Last Mountain, J. A. Maharg, of Maple Creek and J. F. Reid, of MacKenzie. From Alberta there will be: Dr. Clarke of Red Deer, W. A. Buehnan of Lathbridge and James Douglas of Strathcona. In addition to the W. H. White, of Victoria, and Dr. J. P. Molloy, of Provencher, who are on the Opposition side, will of course vote for the McMeister amendment.

BY ELECTION MATTER BEING CONSIDERED

Rodolphe Lemieux represent the two seats of Maisonneuve and Gaspé.
