Ottawa Feb. 25—Parliament got down to business in earnest to-day following eulogies to Sir Wilfrid Laurier by Sir Thomas White. Mr. D.D. MacKenzie for the Liberal leader and Hon. Rodolph Lemieux, and the opening of the debate on the address, the mover and seconder, two soldiers, Major Redman, of Calgary and Capt. Manion of Fort William, making exceptionally fine speeches. Speaking as representatives of the soldiers they expressed satisfaction with the record of the Government.

All the patriotism of the country, said Major Redman, during the past four years had been concentrated on winning the war; all the energies of the country should now be devoted with the equal patriotism, to solving the tremendous problems of reconstruction.

BEAUTIFYING OF SCHOOL Grounds Discussed By the Public School Board

The regular monthly meeting of the Waterloo Public School Board was held last night there being present Mr. Allan Shantz in the chair, and Messrs. J. Harper, J. B. Bruggman, C. Hemphill, Dr. C.T. Noecker, A.E. Devitt and principal Playford. After the passing of accounts the Teachers' reports were received and ordered filed. A communication was received from the Society of the Kitchener Board in regard to the proposed Technical School but owing to pressure of other business the matter was laid over for consideration later on.

There was considerable discussion in regard to the beautifying of the school grounds by the planting of trees and the laying out of suitable flower beds. During the late war a number of boys who were educated at the school made the supreme sacrifice and it is the intention of the Board to plant a tree with suitable name plate on the school premises in commemoration of their valor. Something of this nature has been proposed by the town fathers and while nothing definite has been decided on by that body the School Board will leave the matter in abeyance for the town being so that there will be no overlapping.

The Property Committee will also beautify the Northern boundary of the grounds by the planting of trees the work to be completed as quickly as possible. The rest of the business was of a routine nature.
