Philadelphia, Pa., July 3.—A Philadelphia man, William Jamieson, was robbed of \$1,000 at a restaurant in Montreal on Tuesday.

Mr. Chas. G. Fox has been chosen to represent the Conservative party in the House of Commons at the election for the Legislature.

The 50th birthday of Father Chiquito will be celebrated on the 30th of July at St. Ann's, Kankakee.

The members of the Law Society have appointed W. A. Howe, C.O., Principal of the new law school, which will be opened in September.

Joseph R. Cox, an Irish Nationalist representing Essex in the House of Commons, has been summoned before the Drogheda Court on July 9th to answer to a charge of conspiracy.

Derivishes Again Deported.
Cairo, July 3.—An engagement had taken place at Arquin, between a force of Egyptian troops under command of Col. Wodehouse and a body of derivishes. The derivishes were defeated and fled. There were 500 killed or wounded. Seventy Egyptian soldiers were also wounded.

The Proposed Royal Grants.
London, July 3.—It is reported that Parliament will be asked to grant the Princess Louise, daughter of the Prince of Wales and fiancée of the Earl of Fife, an allowance of £3,000 until she is married, and after her marriage an annual allowance of £25,000.

The Farnell Commission.
London, July 3.—Mr. Davis continued his testimony before the Farnell Commission today. He stated that he would not object to joining any movement to secure the independence of Ireland if such a movement was backed by a force strong enough to justify the hope of its success.

Brussels, July 3.—A telegram from the Governor-General of the Congo states that the English steamer Louisa, from Liverpool, carrying 800 and loading 2,000 tons, which left Antwerp on May 18, has ascended the Congo as far as Matadi. The question is as to the selection of Matadi as the starting point of the Congo railway is thus decided.
