Parsons **Increase** matches council

Peel Regional chairman Lou Parsons will likely be given a five per cent raise omorrow, bringing his total annual income and fringe benefits to \$44,100. On Thursday, regional council's administration and finance committee approved without debate a commendation that the chairman's income should be increased by five per cent - the same percentage that councillors had awarded themselves in early April.

It had been originally thought that the first resolution for all councillors would have also covered Parsons but it only made specific men-tion of elected councillors' salaries. This new resolu tion will go before the full regional council on Thurs-

day for approval. Until Jan. 1, 1977, Parsons' salary was set and paid for by the Ontario overnment. The province first appointed Parsons in mid-1973 to take over the new regional government in Peel when it was formed on Jan. 1, 1974. Regional council re-

appointed Parsons as chairman when it started paying his salary last year. At that time it was set at \$38,000 plus \$4,000 in fringe benefits




