Dear Sir:-

During the past three weeks the Spanish Influenza has swept through this institution. I regret to report that as a result five of our pupils are dead. They are as follows:

Pupil No. 0II3 Georgina House,

- " " .OIZI Jane Baptiste.
- " " .0137 Sarah Seesay.
- " . 205 David Lightning.
- " .206 William Cardinal.

The first four named died in the dormiteries at the school. The last named William Cardinal died as a runiway from the school. His body was taken to his home at Saddle Lake.

We have had a most distressing experience at the school. All the children and many of the whites have been down. At times we hardly knew which way to move. For a week or more all that we kik could do was to exist as best we were able. If it had not been for volunteer help from Red Deer I do not think we should have come through without some break-down. The members of the stage who were able to be around did splendid and heroic work. Iwould like to particularly mention the names of Mrs. E.J.Ralston, the Matron; and Rev. T. Smith, the Assistant Principal. Both these employees were very faithful in our hour of trouble. Among the helpers from town were two Salvation Army officers who threw themselves into the work when things were darkest. Everyone is now up and around and things are looking brighter. The deaths occured I4-I6 of the month. For sickness, conditions at this school are nothing less than criminal. We have no issation ward and no hospital equiptment of any kind. The dead, the dying, the sick and the convalescent, were all together. I think that
