


Fig. 8.—Wragg.

Mr. John Wragg of Wankee, Iowa, informs me that this appeared as a spront among a lot of Morello cherries purchased from Messrs. Ellwanger & Barry, Rochester, N.Y., twenty or more years ago. Its hardiness and productiveness attracted his attention. It has now become widely disseminated, and is doing well in many sections. Two of the three trees planted here have been injured by winter. In appearance and season the fruit resembles English Morello quite closely, ripening this year the first week in August. (See Fig. 8).
