

The Planet, says:-The effect of the corn crop damage will soon be more visibly felt in various ways. Already there has been an important decrease in corn receipts at Western primary markets, and the exports of corn during the eleven eleven months of the current year have been only 99,600,000 bushels, against 167,900,000 bushels the same -time last year-a decrease of not far from 50 per cent. Short crops of corn. and cotton are not elements of prosperity, no matter how much compensation growers may receive in better prices, nor how much the loss may be counteracted by business activity in other directions. True prosperity is based on abundance, not scarcity.

SAN JOSE SCALE.

To the Editor of the Planet, Dear Sir,-The fruit growers of Ontario are becoming more and more interested in the San Jose Scale, and the question of how to extinguish it has become one of great importance to many who first looked upon the agitation with indifference. In the ginal centres of infestation the San Jose Scale has multiplied and spread during the past season more than ever before. There is no longer lack of evidnce of its destructiveness, for many fruit trees have been killed by t at these old infested points. results from the remedies used last spring, when applied carefully and ac-cording to the instructions, are very satisfactory and encouraging, and the Minister of Agriculture will supply spraying material: (whale oil soap and crude petroleum) for the de-struction of the San Jose Scale, at one half its cost, laid down.

PURE BRED STOCK FOR THE NORTH WEST

In order to assist in improving the class of live stock raised in the Northwest Territories, the department of agriculture at Regina, last year arranged with the C. P. R., to carry fine bred bulls from any part of Ontario or Manitoba, to any part of the Territories at a uniform freight rate of five dollars per head. The plan five dollars per head. The plan proved so satisfactory that negotiation swere recently opened between the Department and the C, P. R. with a view of extending the assistance given by the Department towards the importation of pure bred cattle into the Territories. The Department was anxious to secure from the Company the privilege of including female stock in the free cars placed at its disposal. While the Company cannot see its way clear to grant this request, an assurance has been given to the effect that the arrangement respecting free transportation of male stock in vogue during the current year will be continued during the coming year. The Commissioner of Agriculture has, however, decided to carry purebred cows and heifers under an arrangement similar to that now adopted in respect to bulls. The regulations for the coming year will contemplate the carrying of bulls from any point in the Province of Manitoba and Ontario to any point in the Territories at the usual uniform rate, namely five dollars per head, and purebred cows and heifers will be accepted for ship-ment under exactly the same conditions upon a payment of \$7.50 per head. In the latter case the Department will be called upon to pay the proportionate carload rate, which will, of course involve somewhat heavier expense under this vote. It is the desire of the Department that the privileges offered be made use of by the people of the Territories to the greatest possible extent, and it would be well for the ranchers in the Northwest who desire to purchase purebred stock, and breeders in Ontario and Manitoba, who have such stock for sale, to open correspondence with one another or with the Department of Agriculture at Regina.
