was the finest exhibit of butter in point of quality that he had ever judged. The exhibit of cheese was also very fine—two Ontario cheeses that were shown not getting in the prize money. The number of exhibits showed an increase of about 25 per cent. over last year. The greatest increase was in the exhibits of cheese and dairy butter. Manitoba captured the lion's share of awards for cheese, and Alberta those for butter.

Great interest was taken in a butter-making competition, in which there were six competitors in the open class and three in the amateur class. The contest was watched by large crowds throughout. The competitions were in charge of Dairy Commissioner Gibson and Messrs. W. J. Crowe and D. G. McKennie, who also had charge of the dairy exhibits. So perfect were the competitors in the open class in their work, that at the time of our visit to the exhibition the judges had been unable to decide the winners, and were planning to place the awards according to the quality of the butter made. In all there were about 45 entries made by 12 cheese factories and 15 creameries.

## Market Review and Forecast

**TORONTO, Monday, August 6th, 1917.**  
—During the past week the markets have been a little easier. The continued hot weather gave the farmers a chance to get in most of their grain, which in Ontario, has yielded a bumper crop. Grain crop prospects in the prairie provinces are not bright. Continued drought has done considerable damage through the southern Saskatchewan and southeastern Alberta. Rain is badly needed throughout the West if there is to fill out property. Grain crops throughout Ontario are very promising. Spring-sown crops throughout the province generally give promise of large yields, and even fall wheat, which had looked poor, is filling up better than was expected. The outstanding feature in farming conditions is the unusually healthy crops. Many farmers are finding it impossible to secure help, even at the high prices which they are prepared to offer.

### WHEAT.

Prices of Manitoba wheat have been a little easier this week. Two sales of Ontario wheat have been made. Grain sales generally have been few. Quotations follow: No. 1 northern, \$2.10; No. 2, \$2.37; Ontario wheat, No. 2 winter, \$2.55 to \$2.60, according to freight outside; No. 2 winter, \$2.55 to \$2.58.

### COARSE GRAINS.

The coarse grain market has been rather inactive during the week. A few cars of sample oats, however, have been selling at about \$1.00. Manitoba oats—Track, bay ports, No. 2 C.W.S.; other grains nominal. Montreal quotes as follows: No. 1 W. No. 85c; No. 2; extra No. 1 feed, 83c to 84c; corn, \$2.25 to \$2.40; barley, feed, \$1.25.

### MILLEFEES.

The milled market is continuing strong, with the following prices prevailing: Car lots delivered, Montreal freights, shorts, \$4; bran, 35c; middlings, \$4; to \$4.50; extra No. 2 bag, \$2.25; Montreal quotations: Bran, 35c; shorts, \$4; middlings, \$5.00.

### HAY AND STRAW.

With the farmers busy getting in their hay crops there is not much movement on the hay market. Bright hot weather of the past week has been most of the hay in barn or crop. Hay—Track, Toronto, extra No. 2, \$11.50 to \$12; mixed, \$9 to \$10; straw, car lots, \$5 to \$5.50.

### POTATOES AND BEANS.

New potatoes sold here at \$5.25 to \$5.40. Old potatoes are practically off the market. Crop prospects are good, the dry weather having minimized the export market. Beans for immediate shipment are being offered on the Detroit market at \$3.50 to \$4.00. October beans are selling there at \$2.25 per bushel, shipping points.
