Provincial Secretary said that he had listened with great interest to the paper which had been read by the learned member for Sydney; because be had conceived from many that amid much that was impossible to obtain, there was something that yet had not been attempted, and that ought to be attempted for the benefit of Nova Scotia. There were paths untrod, and the greatest of these was the sweeping away of the exclusive privileges of the bar.
