" An AA to continue and amend an AC passed in the twentieth year of His Majesty's Reign intitled an Ordinance for regulating all such perfors as keep horses and carriages to let and hire for the accommodation of Travellers commonly called and known by the name of *Maitres de Poste.*"

" An Act to provide Returning Officers for Knights Citzens and Burgeffes to ferve in Affembly."

Then Mr. Speaker ad reffed His Excellency in the following words: "May it pleafe i our Excellency,

"TO approve of the Bill which the Affembly with the concur-"rence of the Legislative Council have passed introvled "An Act to establish a fund for paying the Salaries of the Officers of the "Legislative Council and Affembly, and for defraying the contingent expen-"ces thereof."

"The honor I have of being at this moment the Organ of the Affembly, gives me that of affuring His Majefty in its behalf, that the Affembly will be conftantly difposed to grant him all the affistance in

" its power neceffary for the fupport and glory of His Crown.

"The condefection and mildnefs of Your Excellency's Adminif-"tration in this Province and the confidence the Alfenbly have there-"in, is the only reafon for the fmallnefs of the fupply, (the burthen of "which they have endeavoured to throw upon those in affluence) until an opportunity will permit them to manifest their zeal by a more efficacious aid, if by a further knowledge of the State of the Province "they fee the neceffity or the benefit that might arife therefrom."

And having delivered the Bill-

His Excellency was pleafed to reply-

" In His Majefty's name, I affent to this Bill and thank His Loval "Subjects reprefenting the People of 1 ower Canada for the aid it affords."

After which his Excel'ency was pleafed to make the following most gracious Speech to both Houfes, videlicet.

" Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

" and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

"A T the first meeting of the Legislature I congratulated you up-"on the flattering prospects which opened to your view, and and upon the flourishing and tranquil state of the British Empire them at peace with all the world; fince that period I am forry to find tis tranquility has been disturbed by the unjustifiable and unprece-"dented
