"I went to Rossland a few days ago to look into the labor difficulties which have tied up the mining operations there since the 12th of July. I had a conference with the leaders of the strike, and at their request I cabled their demands to the directorate of the Le Roi Mining company in London, requesting an imediate reply from them, stating what their policy was or would be with respect to these demands. The next day I received the following cable:

'In reference to your cable dated the 12th, the board of directors have tele graphed MacDonald assuring him that they have not the slightest intention of changing their policy with regard to the strike, and have asked him to take immediate steps to make this public.
