Local News

THE PROBS

TORONTO, Aug. 19.-Rain has fallen almost generally from the peninsula of Ontario to the Atlantic coast, elsewhere the weather has been fine.

Forecast. Moderate winds, continued unsettled, warm today and on Thursday with occasional showers or thunderstorms.

More Recruits. Recruits are coming in steadily to the forces of the 25th Brant Dragoons and last night three more excellent men were enlisted. Four of the Dragoon officers will possibly go to the war as paymasters.

Motor Hearse Visit. The motor hearse to visit this city will be seen this afternoon when it makes the journey from Hamilton to Greenwood cemetery, conveying all that remains of the late Mrs. Wilson, of this city, whose death took place at Hamilton.

For the Northwest. Twenty-five able bodied fellows left the city yesterday by the P. H. and E. to travel by the C. P. R. to the Northwest where they are to be employed as farm laborers. They formed a small group of one of the first Northwest season excursions.

Arbitration Adjoined. The arbitration in the matter between the L. E. and N. Railway and the owners of the Jos. Stratford property adjourned yesterday at the request of counsel for the owners until Monday Aug. 31st. The formal papers were put in and the board, accompanied by both counsels visited the property in question.

LOOK AFTER FAMILIES. PARIS, Aug. 19.-The Society of Fine Arts and other groups have formed a committee under the title of the Brotherhood of Artists to look after the wives and families of 2,000 painters, sculptors, engravers and architects who are serving with the colors. Count Castillon De Saint Victor, the well known aeronaut, who last year became a Jesuit priest at Canterbury, England, has returned to join his old regiment and will leave for the frontier in a few days.

WILL NOT CALL POLICE. REGINA, Sask., Aug. 19.-In view of the fact that with the exception of men in the Mounted Police, all army reservists throughout Canada have been called in. It is now regarded that at least in the early stages of the war, no call for mounted policemen report to the colors will be made. They are doing important Imperial service in the mounted force, which the authorities, as a precautionary measure, wish to maintain at full strength.

LOTS OF FOOD

Has Arrived at English Ports, and the Country is Satisfied.

GLASGOW, via London, Aug. 19, 2:45 a.m.-The arrival at English ports of several food ships this week has seen the Englishmen satisfied to Englishmen. This week has seen the arrival of the liner Columbia from New York with 8,000 bushels of rye and the steamships Letitia and Scandinavia of Batavia with large cargoes of grain. Besides these several large ships have arrived from the Black Sea and from New Orleans with various food stuffs. Other ships are on the way with fruit, dairy products, wheat and sugar which will provide for England's wants for a considerable time.

Loosening Up. Trade is Reported Whole Lot Better in New York and London

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.-The willingness of bankers to buy exchange bills passed on wheat and oil shipments, and the confidence expressed by steamship companies in their ability to make deliveries in England, France and Spain, has resulted in a feeling of encouragement among the grain-exporters and a consequent heavy buying of both wheat and oats for export. Steamship companies are still busy with old orders, but exporters expected that new orders would soon be taken. Another factor that stimulated the grain market is the reduction in the insurance rates. Freight rates continue high, three and four times what they were before the war demoralized everything. But the British steamship lines which cancelled charters at the old rates are not taking advantage of it. When they cancelled complaint was made to the British corn trade association which complained to their government. All British lines are taking grain at the old rates.

IN ENGLAND TOO. NEW YORK, Aug. 19.-The announcement from London that English steamship service has been ordered to resume, has resulted in an easier feeling in importing circles. Lines that responded to this feeling, included drugs, chemicals, olive, coccoanut and other oils, rubber and pig tin.

The spice market also is easier under the belief that many cargoes now held up in the Far East will proceed to their destination in America.

STRONG PROTEST AGAINST TABOO ON CORRESPONDENTS

Daily Telegraph Points Out That World Will Learn Little of War.

[By Special Wire to the Courier.] LONDON, Aug. 19.-The Daily Telegraph in its leading editorial today protests against the action of the English and Belgian authorities in ousting newspapermen from the field of action.

"The restrictions placed upon the work of war correspondents go far, far beyond the attitude of the press and then is consistent with public interest."

"If all goes at the authorities intend there will not be any unofficial, full and independent account of any action fought in the war. Nobody who is not a soldier will see anything, and the soldiers will have something else to do than record their observations and impressions. The newspapers do not ask unreasonable things. They do not desire to publish a line thoughtless or undesirable. What they ask is only that the greatest war of modern times should not be fought in the total absence of independent and expert narrators."

"The government's action would be starving the nation's interest in the greatest concern it has and would deprive the future historian of his materials."

IN SWITZERLAND

There Are Million Foreigners-It Costs Half Million Daily for Army.

[By Special Wire to the Courier.] LONDON, Aug. 19, 4:13 a.m.-A despatch to The Daily Chronicle from Geneva says: "It is estimated that there are nearly a million foreigners at present in Switzerland. Food, which is entering Switzerland over every frontier except that of Germany is plentiful, but very expensive."

"The German consul general has issued a warning to foreigners that any person found on Germany's southern frontier, especially in Baden, or in Alsace-Lorraine, without passports is likely to be arrested as a spy and shot."

"Four Russians, alleged to have been army officers, were cast today at Friedrichshafen, on the east shore of Lake Constance, in Wurtemberg. This indicates that many who are stranded in border towns of Germany are likely to find themselves in grave danger."

"Switzerland is taking the most elaborate precautions against any violation of her neutrality. The maintenance of the present armed force in Switzerland is costing over half a million dollars a day."
