**SOME FIELDS UNDER WATER.** Windsor, Aug. 13.—Reports from all parts of Essex yesterday indicate that the heavy rains have almost ruined crops everywhere. **RUSSIA WAR WOUNDED, BUT**

**Col. Kitching of the Salvation Army Tells of Russia Fighting.**

By Special Wire to the Courier.  
London, Aug. 14.—Col. Theodor Kitching, of the Salvation Army headquarters, in an article to the Chronicle from Petrograd, dated July 24, communicates his impressions of Russia war-worn, wounded, in mourning, phoned or widowed, with the enemy her front gate, and yet determinedly hopeful, secure in her faith of victory. "Within the last eight months," writes Col. Kitching, "I have visited many European countries which are affected by war. In each case I have visited the capital as well as the smaller cities, and have seen something of the underworld of poverty and sorrow and death which pervades the homes of the lower classes, as well as the grief and tears and suffering that reigns in the homes of the middle and upper classes. Of all the cities I visited in none is the fact of war more evident, and that at every turn than it is in Petrograd. It is impossible to get away from the memory. Everywhere there are wounded soldiers and nurses.  
"And yet hope reigns, not despair. There are countless sad faces, but sadness is rather the expression of sober determination than of grief and anguish. It is something that is typically Russian. It is something you feel you have seen before, but know not where, and then you remember that you have seen it in the past in some war picture of a soldier, a chieftain, and as you look again, very look makes you clench your teeth and set your chin and then your shoulders back and say to yourself: "Yes, we must go on; whatever cost we must go on to the end."  
"You may have to wait, but if you will only wait long enough you will see this spirit of hopefulness, of firm determination, of unshaken unwavering confidence as of the matter issue. It was well put by an accomplished student, the proprietor of large estates, with whom I conversed.  
"It is true our brave troops had to fall back on some of the fronts," he said, "and they may have fallen back still further, but we have plenty of room to fall back. We fall back from Warsaw there is Pinsk, in the Pripiet marshland. We fall back from Pinsk, there is Kiev. If we fall back from Kiev there is still Kharkov, and if we fall back from Kharkov, there are half a dozen places from which we fall back before we fall back to Saratov. And if we fall back to Saratov, there is still Vraisk and Asia to fall back on."  
"In government departments, permanent officials and junior clerks all breathed the same unchanging spirit of hope and of confidence to Russia's loyalty to her allies. The great's loyalty to her allies is the question, nor can there ever be a trap, the sensational talk of dictators and mischief-mongers.  
"Especially is this true of Russia's ally to England. The fact that an Englishman claimed and for me wherever I went the respect and co-operation of every individual with whom I came in contact. Official, clerical and private, they counted me their brother in the greater and mighty cause.
