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RUSSIA SIGNS PEACE WITH BULGARIA

Turkish Proposals Made to Bolsheviki Rejected Kaladines and Dutoff, Cossack Leaders Defeated

Separate Agrerment Signed Between A FRENCH Russia and Bulgaria, Latter Likely A FRENCH Retaining Conquered Territery in Serbia and Roumania

Berne, Jan. 10.—A separate peace agreement has been signed by Russia and Bulgaria, The Bund reports.

Bulgaria took part with Germany, Austria and Turkey in the first negotiations at Brest-Litovsk, and it has been assumed that no peace terms would be agreed to by the Central Powers, except in concert. However, advices yesterday, giving the names of those who took part in the first session of the Brest-Litovsk conferences when they were resumed this week, made no mention of a Bulgarian representative.

King Ferdinand of Bulgaria is credited with opposing the formula of peace without annexations or indemnities, declaring Bulgaria should retain the territory she had won. This would not interfere with a peace between Russia and Bulgaria, however, inasmuch as the territory Bulgaria desires consists of parts of Serbia and Roumania. SOLDIERS INJURED BY EXPLOSIVE POWDER AMERICAN

Explosion in Old Post Office Building, Now Occupied by C. O. R. Men, This Morning; Two Hamilton Soldiers Badly Injured

Daniel Clay and Samuel Norman of Hamilton, both veteran soldiers, lie in the General Hosnital here to-day, seriously injured by the explosion of a quantity of high explosive powder in the old postoffice building on George street this morning. All points touching upon the disaster are not yet clear, and the military authorities are far from satisfied as to how the powder came into the building.

The explosion took place shortly before nine o'clock this morning, when Clay and Nor-man were busy preparing their north end of the second floor, the old customs long room The powder, so far as can be ascertained, was lying in a bag beside the stove, and it is surmised that a flying spark ignited the explosive, with a concus building. Windows were shattered to fragments, doors blown from their hinges, and Ptes. ing their feet after the force of the crash, staggered to the door in flames, badly cut and burn-ed. The former sustained par-ticularly severe injuries, his clothes and hair being burned while Norman sustained lesser hurts, mainly about the face and hands. Both men were conveyed as soon as possible to the hospital, where they are reported to be making favorable progress, and are consid-

When the powder came is a problem which is puzzling the officials of the regiment. number of the men who were the first to enter the building last week recall having seen it then in the room where the ex-plosion took place. It was contained in a canvas bag, and, being a black substance in small lumps, was taken for pea coal by those who observed it.

The C.O.R. Regiment has had no high explosive powder in its itself here, and the authorities bent upon ascertaining how, and for what purpose, the explosive came into the build-

The explosion attracted considerable attention in the centre of the city, and greatly exaggerated rumors spread like wildfire. The building itself is but slightly damaged, beyond the shattering of a large number of window panes and damage to the walls and doors of the room where the crash took place. The powder was in the open when it exploded, how-ever, and in view of the force which it exerted under these rife as to the result had any of the explosive found its way into the closed coal stove, upon heating water.
