The Regina Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition Association, Ltd., which has superseded the old agricultural society, is a strong and representative body and one which will lend to the amenities of the fair the necessary prestige. Arrangements have been made with the railway companies to run excursions to the fair from practically every station in the province at the rate of a single fare on the certificate plan.
