ed with hearty applause.

Mr. Wilson pointed out the various issues between the parties such as the objections to the immense pull wood concessions to the immense pulp wood concessions to private parties without public competition; the de-sirability of removing the adminis-tration of the school system from the tration of the school system from the turmoit of party politics; the taking of the liquor traffic out of politics and ceasing to use it as a means to grind money out of hotel keepers and others for party purposes while putting the country to thousands of dollars of expense for a referendum vote where the elector could not know that he was voting for prohibition of whether the hotel keepers were or were not to be compensated country for loss; and the building without Dominion subsidy of the Temiscannique Railway at a cost of \$2,234,000 as an Ontario Government while Ontario contributes about one half of the annual loss of hun dreds of thousands of dollars for the Intercolonial Railway as well as one half of the other railway subsidies in Quebec and elsewhere over the Do-

But Mr. Wilson dealt particularly with the Hon. Mr. Ross' charge that Mr. Whitney in desiring the repeal of the Revenue Act of 1899 was favor-ing corporations. The speaker had that Act with him and showed to the amazement of an intensely attentive house how that statute provided for assessing corporations innumerable by the Government for governmental purposes, and then provided where corporations paid such taxes to the Government the corporations would be relieved from an equal or greater tax to the municipalities. In this way the corporation preferred to pay its taxes to the Government; but these taxes were taken from the municipalities where they justly belonged. And Mr. Whitney desired to repeal the Act and restore the taxes to the municipalities. Mr. Whitney has no desire to tax the corporation twice for the same thing, but he wants to leave the taxes with the local authorities. Mr. Wilson gave several illustrations showing how municipalities were deprived of their rights, and one of these is interesting to Chatham. He pointed out that the assessment in Chatham against the loan company for income was \$13,400 for the year 1897.

\$13,800 for the year 1898.

And then Mr. Ross' Revenue Act was passed and immediately the municipal assessment on this loan corporation dropped to— 85,000 for the year 1899.

\$4,000 for the year 1900. \$3,000 for the year 1901. Although the corporation had a larger capital and d'd a larger busi-ness than when assessed for \$13,800.00.

In this way the City of Chatham is deprived by the Ross government of a yearly assessment upon \$10,800,00 from this one corporation; and this was only one of many cases and many every one of them now pays tribute to the government at Toronto.

Mr. Wilson's statement of the effect

of the Ross statute in favoring corporations to the deprivation of muni cipalities and the burdening of local ratepayers created a sensation in the audience which followed his explanation in breathless silence until the applause at the conclusion. After dealing with this matter Mr

Wilson went into the ballot frauds and had the audience alternately in roars of laughter, wild applause and genuine indignation at what was disclosed in the various election trials and the judgments of the courts, bringing home to the Hon. John Dryden and the me to the Hon. John Dryden and the Hon, J. T. Garrow and Messrs. Preston, Alex. Smith, Vance, Lewis and the other parts of the "machine" the direct responsibility for the deep laid plot and thorough organization of the scheme to hold office, not by the votes of the people, but by the skill and dishonor of miserable creatures imported and paid to manipulate elections, spoil and switch ballots, stuff ballot boxes and then remove or cover up or burn the evidences of guilt. John S. Fraser was accorded a very enthusiastic reception and made a telling address. He took up the question of taxation of corporations and enswered the statements of Mr. Walker and other Pardo speakers completely, showing that the policy he (Mr. Fraser) advocated was in the interests of Liberals and Conservatives alike. Proceeding he showed that the Ross Government did not impose taxation on railroads, except \$5 per mile and that the taxation of these roads should be at least ten times that figure, also that the taxes times that figure, also that the taxes leviable upon them should go to the municipalities through which the lines ran and that the basis of taxation upon the railroad land and improvements thereon should be similar to that of the municipalities in which they are situated. He illustrated his argument by the township of Ralargument by the township of Ral-eigh, which had four railroads runeigh, which had four railroads run-ning across it. The taxation thereon should be on the same principal as that on the farmers and other pro-perty. If this were done, they could rebate half the taxes paid by the railroads and still have ten times the


