KITCHEN HELPS.

Don't wipe out the coffee-pot with the dishcloth. Don't let the breakfast grounds stand half a day.

Clara Barton's Cross.

It is a massive gold cross, the body of which is red enamel, with the Servian coat of arms in gold on one side and the date of their accession to the brotherhood, 1870, on the other. To Whiten One's Hands.

Pour some lemon juice into an equal quantity of glycerin and rub your hands with the mixture before going to bed. Serving Anchovies.

An effective way of serving anchovies is as follows: Cut twelve rounds of crumb of bread slightly larger than silver half dollars and fry these in butter. Drain them and lay on each round a thin slice of cucumber previously marinated in oil and vinegar and seasoned with salt and cayenne pepper. In the middle of the cucumber place, with the cut side downward, half a stoned olive and curl round it a fillet of anchovy. Decorate the dish with tomatoes and endive.

Pineapples.

To take the "eyes" out of a pineapple if the proper utensil is not at hand it will be found that slicing the fruit first greatly facilitates the operation. It is easy afterward to cut off the skin if the pine is to be served in slices, and, obviously, still less difficult if to cut the fruit into discs is intended.

Stewed Bacon.

If you wish a good dish of stewed bacon, wash and scrape the bacon, put in a steamer over boiling water and cook forty minutes or until tender. Pick off the thick outside skin when cool, season well and sprinkle with brown breadcrumbs. Put into the oven for a few minutes.

Carpet Patterns.

A carpet of small pattern is much more economical than a floor covering with a large, sprawling design. It can be mended, turned over and the small figure matched very easily, while the large pattern is a very terror to the contriving housekeeper.

THE FAST TRAINS TO CHICAGO.

New York Central's Express Service Added to.

George H. Daniels, General Passenger Agent of the New York Central Road, talking yesterday of the company's fast train service, said that, in addition to the new twenty-hour train, there are now four twenty-four-hour trains to Chicago, and two Empire State expresses daily.

The Twentieth Century Limited, twenty-hour train, leaves New York every day at 2:45 p. m. and arrives at Chicago the next morning at 9:45. The Lake Shore Limited leaves New York at 5:30 every afternoon, arriving in Chicago the next afternoon at 4:30. The Fast Mail, a fine twenty-four-hour train, leaves New York at 8:45 a. m. every day, reaching Chicago the next morning at 7:50, by both the Lake Shore and the Michigan Central. The noonday Chicago Limited leaves New York at 1 p. m., reaching Chicago by the Lake Shore the next morning at 11:50, a twenty-four-hour train, really twenty-three hours and fifty minutes. The Detroit and Chicago Limited leaves New York at 4 p. m., reaching Chicago the next afternoon at a fourth twenty-four-hour train—From the New York Times.

Note.—The New York Central also has 15 trains a day between New York and Buffalo and Niagara Falls; 5 trains a day between New York and St. Louis and Cincinnati; 4 trains a day between New York and Montreal and by its Boston and Albany Division 4 trains a day between New York and Boston via Springfield.

LION STALKING.

The crack of the rifle was answered by the snarling roar of a wounded lion. The bullet, passing through the buck, had struck the mighty beast as he was about to spring. And it had no more than wounded him.

He leaped for the smoke, coming on in flying bounds, while my old friend fumbled wildly with his powder horn. He was too slow. The bullet had not dropped into the barrel before the lion was upon him. One crunch of his tremendous jaws, and an arm was stripped to the bone. Another, and the side of his face had vanished. The cavernous throat above the prostrate man roared once more, before the teeth should clash together, when the son, running up, put his rifle barrel to the lion's side, and drove a half-ounce bullet through his heart.

The chances are in favor of the lion when accident brings him and man together.
