## OPPOSES THE

Ex-Mayor Martin Writes the Rate-payers Giving His Views on the By-law.

That There is no Necessity for the Furchase of More Land at Present and the Price is Too High.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—You are asked to vote on a by-law to be submitted to you on the 7th of January for the purpose of issuing debentures against the city to the extent of \$9,000, to be used in purchasing land to enlarge our cemeing, composed of representatives from the different churches in the city, to hold a union watch night service-in Park St. Methodist church, on Dec. chasing land to enlarge our ceme-tery grounds; for levelling and drain-ing the same; and for taking water John Green, of Cleveland, O., form-erly of The Planet staff, was a Mamains out to and erecting hydrants

The present ground—30 acres—was bought in the year 1869—32 years ago—and notwithstanding the many removals from other burying places into it, and the numerous family plots purchased, but as yet unfilled, as well as the grounds around the caretaker's house, there still remains some twelve or fifteen

acres yet unused.

The interest we would have to pay on the money till the time we would require to use the land would much

more than buy it when needed.

Not only so, but the price placed
on the thirty acres under considera
tion is \$4,500, that is \$150 per acre, which is about three times its value Land in that locality is fit only for agricultural purposes, and even \$50 per acre for unimproved land of its quality is a high price. There are a few individuals who seem anxious for some reason to have this by-law passed and use as an argument that we might not be able to secure the ground when needed.
About this there need be no fear. Land alongside a cemetery is not eagerly sought after for anything, except agricultural purposes, and as the land in question has been used and proper notice.
