The May Music Festival.

The May Music Festival, to which the public generally has been looking forward with no small degree of interest for weeks back, took place according to arrangement in College Hall this week. There were three performances, on Tuesday evening, Wednesday afternoon and Wednesday evening. All were of exceptional interest, and were thoroughly enjoyed by large audiences. Prof. Maxim has certainly done good work during the winter with his Choral Club and Orchestra, as was evidenced in the rich treat enjoyed by those who attended the Festival. In addition to the many who attended from Wolfville and neighboring towns a goodly number were present from Halifax, Windsor, Hantsport, Kentville, and other places, and all were delighted with the entertainment given. On Tuesday evening the weather was most unfavorable, but in spite of this the hall was well filled, and in the two concerts of Wednesday the seating capacity of the house was fully taxed. On each occasion an excellent program was presented, which the space at our disposal will not permit us to describe in detail. The renderings by the Choral Club, however, were by general consent pronounced to be the most pleasing feature, and the 30 voices when supported by the orchestra of twenty pieces combined in one grand harmony, that will not soon be forgotten by those who heard it. (Special platforms erected for the purpose were occupied by the chorals and orchestra, while from a commanding position in front Prof. Maxim with great skill controlled and directed the performance.) The soloists who came from Boston, were no doubt a great assistance, and were generously applauded.

Artistically, financially and from the standpoint of attendance the Festival was a grand success and congratulations are due to all who contributed to make it such. We understand that the May Music Festival is to become in future a permanent feature of the year.

A Suggestion Respecting Funerals.

Dear Mr. Editor:

Kindly allow me to make a suggestion through your columns which may be of service for the future.

It sometimes happens that deaths occur in our community, of which many fail to hear of at all until, it may be, the funeral is over, and the opportunity is past for those offices of sympathy and respect which many would be prompt to improve. Having no daily paper, and having no services in the churches at which the community is largely represented except on Sundays, it is very easy for a death to occur and the funeral to pass, while large numbers remain entirely ignorant of these events. A case recently occurred where the writer heard nothing of a death, until he saw some days later an account of the funeral in the Halifax Herald. He learns that his friends generally were in like ignorance of the sad occasion, which had they known of it would immediately have called out their sympathy and interest.

Would it not be well in cases like this, where it is agreeable to the friends, that the undertaker should see that a notice is posted in the post-office, by which means the information would reach the public generally? The post-master would doubtless gladly grant the courtesy of this arrangement, and many would be saved regrets that through ignorance they had been unable to extend their timely need of sympathy to sorrowing friends.

Meeting of the Board of School Commissioners.

The regular annual meeting of the

Board of School Commissioners was

held in the Court House, Kentville,

on Tuesday, May 10th. Inst. Com-

missioners Chipman, Strong, Shaw,

Pineo, Reid, Patterson, Fuller Hiltz,

Sanford, A. Bishop, and West were

present. Chipman was elected Chair-

man for the incoming year.

The Inspector reported that 128

schools were in operation, taught by

135 teachers, classed as follows:—A.

4—B. 38—C. 53—D. 40—Male 9—

Female 126. The Schools were main-

tained with regularity and a good de-

gree of efficiency. The School Land

Fund of Cornwallis has to its credit,

in Deposit Receipt, in the bank and

in hands of the Treasurer, income

from the invested funds, \$1000.

The following business was transac-

ted:—1. To Lake View section No. 27,

and to North River No. 87 was voted

the aid to build allowed under section

No. 125, School Act. 2. Voted, to

unite Mountain Home section No. 94,

conditionally to Stronach Mt. in An-

napolis County, and thus create a

Border section between Kings and

Annapolis. The condition made was

that the Annapolis Board concur in

action and that the C. P. I. sanction

the action of both Boards. 3. The

following grants were made from the

School Land Fund of Cornwallis:—

(a) \$75 to Pine Woods to help provide

a school if the Inspector finds it pos-

sible to secure a house and teacher to

maintain a school. (b) \$25 to West

Halls Harbor for repairs on school

house. (c) \$100 to East Halls Har-

bor to aid in new school house. (d)

\$100 to Baxters Harbor Mt. towards

building a new school house. (e) \$50

to Coldbrook in aid of building to re-

place house burned. (f) \$50 to Scotts

Bay Road for repairs. And (g) \$25 to

White Waters for repairs. 4. Voted

that the resolution passed last year to

give \$10 to each section in Cornwallis

from the School Land Fund towards

a library under regulation, provided

the section contribute a like sum, be

continued another year. 5. Voted

that the Inspector draw the balance

of the Fund in the hands of the Treas-

urer and put the same in the bank

on Deposit Receipt bearing interest.

6. The "Poor School List" was contin-

ued for another year, subject to the

new regulation requiring these that

receive special aid to assess an aver-

age rate for the county. 7. A petition

was presented from Stephen Schofield

asking to be set from Brooklyn (C)

section to Lakeville. As the law had

not been complied with re guard

notice, etc., it was referred to W. W.

Pineo, G. Reid and the Inspector to

investigate and report at next meet-

ing. 8. A petition from Windermere

addressed to the Inspector under the

disruption of said section, was referred to

the Inspector to make enquiries and see if

the parties still want the matter con-

sidered and if so to direct them to

present their case in a proper form.

9. A petition was presented from Per-

ceux Mt. asking for the formation of

a new section. The law had not been
