THE INFORMATION that the civic authorities are moving in THE INFORMATION that the civic authorities are moving in the matter of securing more efficient street lighting for the have been invited, so we are informed, for the supply of the ma-terials required and the installation of a modern system. We have been spending a considerable amount yearly for the lighting of our public streets, but have not received adequate service to repay for the amount invested. This is due, so it is stated, to the fact that the whole system is antiquated and badly arranged. With the new arrangement it is thought the lighting may be very considerably improved without great additional cost, and the comfort of citizens and the reputation of the town generally. It is to be devoutly hoped that the work may be speedily proceeded He with so that we may have the advantage of the improved service during the season of short days and dark nights. In this connection we would recommend to the consideration of the town government the making of an agreement with business places on Main street to keep their window-lights on every evening during the week instead of only two nights as at present. This could probably be arranged if the current for the service was provided against to the devided advantage of all approximate The provided gratis, to the decided advantage of all concerned. The same policy might be pursued with advantage in the matter of verandah lights on the residential streets, which now present a desolate appearance at night.

These lights, if kept turned on, would give our town a very much more attractive appearance and add greatly to the comfort of those who under present conditions are obliged to grope their way around after nightfall. With the splendid facilities now enjoy-ed it would be a great mistake to permit the present unsatisfactory condition of streat lighting to continue here the in malls condition of street lighting to continue longer than is really neces sary. diff.






