BREEZY BUDGET FROM BUSY BATH

House Lost By Fire—New Lodge of Pythian Sisters

An automobile accident, in which a local party were the occupants, occurred on Friday evening last about six miles north of Woodstock. It is not known exactly how it occurred, but it is understood that the car got out of control precipitating the occupants over an embankment, injuring them all more or less severely. Those in the car were Rev. W. M. Donohoe, Johnville, who was accompanied by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Donohoe; Mrs. Simon Gallagher, Bath; Miss Gertrude Connolly, Bath; and Miss Ruby K. Smeaton, Montreal. Father Donohoe and his father escaped serious injury. The ladies, however, were all rushed to the Fisher Memorial hospital, Woodstock, where Mrs. Donohoe and Mrs. Simon Gallagher are now confined. Miss Connolly and Miss Smeaton, whose injuries were of a less serious nature, were able to leave the hospital on Sunday last.

From the arrival of the express on Monday, the R. P. Hall on Main street was the centre of unceasing activities. A large number of ladies were initiated into mystic rites of Pythian Sisterhood, as were a smaller number of Knights. The proceedings ended with a lunch at a time when needed. While it is necessary to draw the veil of secrecy over the proceedings, it may be said that this inauguration ceremony was in the highest degree successful, and that Bath is now second in importance in this respect to the town of Woodstock.
