BOB-CATS ARE
KILLING DEER.

The Government Should be Urged
to Place a Bounty on These
Destructive Animals at
Once.

During these days when the laws
with regard to killing big game
without a license are so strictly
enforced it might be well worth
while to call the attention of the
government to the fact that many
deer are killed each year by bob-
cats, which infest the New Brun-
swick woods, and that no bounty
is placed on them. One of these
animals was but recently shot at
Magog, and it is alleged by the
most experienced guides that
fully twenty times as many deer are
destroyed in this manner, the bob-
cats finding out where the yards
of deer are located. In the fall al-
so the deer is followed by the bob-
cat into swamps and marshy
places in the woods, and there de-
stroy them.
Bounties have been placed by the
government on many animals, and
the bob-cat should be included in

the list, if our supply of big game is
to be kept in any way undim-
inished. No doubt many of these
animals would be killed by the
farmer's and hunter's were a bounty
placed upon them—and thus
more effective work would be done
in the preserving of game than by
the enforcing of license laws.

CROSSED CONTINENT
IN 88 HOURS.

Quebec, Sept. 21.—The overseas
mail train reached here this after-
noon, two hours ahead of its sched-
ule time and an hour later the C.
P. R. steamship Empress of Brit-
ain was on her way down the
St. Lawrence for Liverpool. The
overseas train left Vancouver
Monday night at 7 o'clock, six
hours behind its schedule time and
arrived here today at 2 o'clock, hav-
ing crossed the continent in eighty-
eight hours. Allowing three hours
or the difference in time, this is an
average speed of thirty-five
miles an hour. This is a long dis-
tance record for an unbroken trip
by one continuous train.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 26.—At
a luncheon to Earl Grey which
inaugurated the new Canadian
Club, yesterday, Chairman F. G.

ed "What is our destiny?"
In his reply the Earl, referring
to the question of Mr. Wade, said
he had not come to Vancouver
with any scheme of imperial fed-
eration, but if the feeling of the
chairman was widely shared in the
Dominion, Canada had only to ask
the people of Great Britain to ad-
mit her into her councils, and if
she was prepared to assume her
share of the responsibilities, and
obligations to the empire, then,
she would meet with the heartiest
possible response and welcome
from the people of England.
