OUR SCHOOLS.

In the letter of our Bridgetown cor-
 respondent, published in last issue,
 vigorous opposition is manifested to
 our proposal to provide better educa-
 tional facilities to the children of the
 Buie and Bayle schools by having
 them conveyed to the central school.
 We feel that our correspondent has
 not given all sides of the question due
 consideration, and that, when he re-
 views the case, he will come over to
 our way of thinking in the matter.

As many of the Buie and Bayle
 pupils must carry their dinners to
 school, they are away from home as
 many hours in the day as they would
 be were they attending the Central
 school. And for those who do not
 now carry their dinner, conveyance
 to the Harkins Academy would pro-
 vide them with the inestimable privi-
 lege of attending a school wherein
 every single grade has a teacher of its
 own. In the miscellaneous schools we
 would centralize each teacher has now
 four or five grades, and it stands to
 reason that each grade gets only one-
 fourth or one-fifth the personal atten-
 tion and supervision it would have in
 the Central school. Our correspondent
 evidently overlooked this great advan-
 tage which would come to his
 children if an arrangement could be
 made by which they, as well as the
 children of the main part of the town,
 would be placed in single grade de-
 partments.

The cost of conveying pupils to the
 Centre should be very little, if any,
 greater than the present cost of jan-
 itors, fuel and upkeep of the buildings
 in the two schools under considera-
 tion. And what a benefit to the
 pupils concerned our proposal would
 provide! At any rate, it was made,
 not with the idea of conspiring against
 Bridgetown's liberties, but with the
 hope of greatly improving the educa-
 tional prospects of her children.
