CANADA INCREASING

Business Growing and Immigration Gaining Every Year

Ottawa, May 26.—Canada's total trade for the past fiscal year amounted to \$862,699,732, an increase of no less than 103,695,343 as compared with the preceding fiscal year.
Imports totaled \$374,382,582, an increase of nearly \$86,000,000. Exports totaled \$488,317,150, an increase of nearly \$18,000,000. The year's increase in trade is over 14 per cent, is one of the largest if not the largest in the history of Canada.

IMMIGRATION INCREASED

The total immigration to Canada during the fiscal year ended March 31, 1912, was 354,237, compared with 311,084 in the previous year, an increase of 14 per cent. Of the total arrivals during the year 215,138 were at ocean ports as compared with 189,817 in the previous year.

There was an increase in the number of arrivals from the United States from 121,451 for fiscal year 1910-11 to 133,710 in the fiscal year 1911-12.

Of the total immigration 211,266 were adult males, 82,922 adult females, and 60,049 were children. The increase in the number of males as compared with the preceding year was 26,068, in females 11,884, and in children 5,201.

Biggest Ship In The World

Hamburg, Germany, May 23.—The Hamburg American line's new mammoth trans-Atlantic steamer Imperator, the biggest vessel in the world, was successfully launched here this morning.

Emperor William acted as sponsor. The launching weight of the Imperator was 29,755 tons, but when completed it is believed she will displace about 52,000 tons.

Among the innovations introduced on the new vessel, as a result of the Titanic tragedy, the company has determined to swing on board lifeboats in which room is provided for every soul carried by the steamer and have them in readiness for launching at any moment.

The Imperator will carry three wireless operators, thus providing for continuous service.

TEMPERANCE AND SABBATH REST

New Divisions Formed and Sunday Trains Condensed.

At the services held in two sections of the Fairmount congregations on the 19th, and also at a service held in Bass River, Rev. R. H. Stavert, president of the local branch of the Lord's Day alliance here, brought before the people the matter of the running of a Sunday passenger train through the Maritime Provinces during the summer months—and then appealed to all who disapproved of the contemplated action of the I. C. R. board to rise to their feet. In every section the people were unanimous in their disapproval.

Letters setting forth the expression of opinion given at their meetings have been sent to Hon. F. C. Devane, Hon. R. L. Borden and A. W. Campbell.

At Black River Bridge, May 20th, a large audience assembled in the Presbyterian church, to listen to a temperance lecture by Rev. R. H. Stavert, Grand Worthy Patriarch of the Sons of Temperance. Rev. G. A. Grant occupied the chair and conducted the devotional exercises.

After having used a magic lantern and having shown quite a number of views illustrating the evil effects of the cigarette and of the liquor traffic, Mr. Stavert gave an address on temperance.

At the close of the lecture upwards of seventy persons took the pledge and a division was organized.

BRITISH NAVY REORGANIZED

New Body Will Be Constituted, Applied on Scientific and Speculative Study and Strategics

(Publishers Press News Service) London.—The First Lord of the Admiralty, Winston Churchill, has made further important changes in the organization of the Admiralty, when Admiral Sir Francis Bridgeman, Vice-Admiral Prince Louis of Battenberg and Captain William C. Pakenham became first, second and fourth lords respectively. An admiralty memorandum issued recently completes the naval reorganization by the creation of a Naval War Staff, of which Admiral Ernest Troubridge was appointed private secretary of the first lord of the admiralty, becomes chief.

Sir Francis J. S. Hopwood, formerly under-secretary of state for the colonies, who was on the staff of King George, then Prince of Wales during his visit to Canada in 1903, is appointed an additional civil lord on the Admiralty Board. Rear-Admiral David Beatty, who in 1901 married Ethel Bond, daughter of the late Marshall Field, of Chicago, succeeds Admiral Troubridge in the secretaryship.

Captain George A. Ballard, of the battleship Britannia, and Captain Thomas Jackson, assistant director of naval intelligence, have been appointed directors of the operations division and the intelligence division respectively.

Mr. Churchill in a long explanatory statement says that the War Staff is to be the brain, applied scientifically to scientific and speculative study of naval strategy and preparation, and will be organized from the existing elements in the three divisions, intelligence, operations and mobilization. These divisions will be combined under a flag officer as chief of staff. The War Staff will have no executive authority. Its responsibilities will end with the rendering of advice to the First Sea Lord.

A complete list of the officers forming the staff, which will comprise most of the grades, will be promulgated soon.

Mr. Churchill further explains that the new civil lord will be the "buyer and business manager" of the navy, while there will be close co-operation between the naval staff and the war staff of the army. Captain Alexander L. Duff, director of naval mobilization, has been appointed head of the mobilization division of the new war staff. The rest of the staff will be provided by abolishing four official admiralty vessels, thus saving about \$175,000 annually.

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the undersigned, and enclosed in envelope for Dredging Miramichi Bay N. B., will be received until 4.00 P. M. on Tuesday June 4, 1912, for dredging required at Miramichi Bay in the Province of New Brunswick.
