At the breaking out of the war for independence the Onondagas, of all the North American Indians, were the only large tribe that espoused the cause of the colonists. All others took sides with Great Britain. The Onondagas remained true to the struggling colonists, and in consideration of their services, soon after the close of the war, were allowed a reservation ten miles square, in the most fertile spot in central New York, and added to that the legislature of New York passed a law allowing the parents of all children under 21 years of age \$50 each for their maintenance. Every few years, by an act of legislature, the tribe is allowed to sell off a few thousand acres of reservation on account of a diminution in num-
