American Outlook.

There are many signs that American fish dealers are looking to Newfoundland to supplement their supply of fish. There is the purchase of the whaling establishment at Lark Harbor as a collecting centre for the exporting of fish to America. This, we believe, is but part of the large scheme, referred to in our message to-day, the promoters of which are awaiting the sanction of the Legislature to an agreement they have already entered into with the Government. We learn also that arrangements have been made to supply many fishermen in Bay St. George so that they may be fitted to catch halibut, on a large scale. In the neighbourhood of Ramea halibut is being collected this year and was collected last year and shipped regularly to the States by an auxiliary gasoline schooner.

Gloucester firms are continuing to purchase herring and arranging to ship them from Port aux Basques to market. It will be remembered also that fish has been purchased largely by Gloucester this fall. Unfortunately some of the fish has not turned out well, owing to salm, etc., and the purchasers have had a difficulty in disposing of it. This has caused Gloucester purchasers to shy off, and some shippers on the West Coast are disappointed at their inability to sell good fish to Gloucester.

On the whole, however, the outlook for Newfoundland fishery products is good. The advertising campaign by fish dealers in America has so stimulated the market, that dealers find a difficulty in catering to the demand.

The Washington Treasury decision should strengthen the chances of local merchants shipping in competition with Americans.

We are, however, curious as to Mr. Fiddling's statement as to his Reciprocity Deal. The report has not yet been cabled here. If the Provincers have an open door for their fish, and Newfoundland has a closed door, if Americans can purchase fish in the Provincers and enter it free of duty by the Reciprocity Convention; but cannot do so with fish purchased in Newfoundland now will such a Deal affect the outlook for Newfoundland?

THE E. M. F. IS COMING. How They Perished.

By the Prospero we learn that the two boys Cull, who perished at Foggo on Friday last, left their home that morning to go into the woods, a long distance away, for firewood. In the forenoon it became stormy, with the wind from the E.E. but later it veered suddenly to the N.W. with a terrific blizzard, and as the boys did not return in the evening a search party went out to find them. Both were found dead, and it was evident they had started for home but were overcome and lay down and perished. The bodies were frozen stiff. Their parents and friends are distracted with grief over the awful occurrence.

No News About Reciprocity.

It is not known here whether the Reciprocity Agreement deals with fish. Nothing can be learned either at Ottawa or Washington in advance of the official statement this afternoon.

The Prospero Here.

The s.s. Prospero, Capt. A. Kean, arrived from the Northward after one of the most stormy voyages Capt. Kean in his long years of coastal travel ever experienced. On the voyage North the ship encountered gales of wind with blizzards from the N. and N.E., and after a hard battle the ship got down to Griquet on Saturday last. When the ship reached Tilt Cove, where she took on board 600 barrels of herring, conditions were so bad that the Captain thought he would have to retreat and come South but Thursday morning he got a slant, went to Jackson's Arm, in White Bay, when the wind veered to the westward freed the shore of ice, and leaving Friday she got down to Conche. She then came back to Englee and harbored there that night in a gale of N.W. wind with intense frost, and Saturday morning she faced north again and visited St. Anthony and Griquet, got back to St. Anthony again at dusk and remained until 3 a.m. Sunday when she came south. She called at all ports except Change Islands and Herring Neck which were blocked with ice. The ship is badly iced up brought a fair cargo with 12 bags mail and will not make another trip North. Her passengers were:—Messrs. 25 Below Zero.

The Prospero reports that 25 below zero at St. Anthony and 23 below at Conche. On the ship it was 15 degrees below and the weather going and returning was intensely cold. The ship reports White Bay, Canada Bay and all the arms and harbors down to Griquet solidly frozen over with the ice from 9 inches to over a foot thick. She had to butt her way into Pilley's Island, Fortune Harbor, Little Bay and other places, and had great difficulty in entering them.

Section Foreman Killed

Orangeville, Ont., Jan. 26.—C. P. E. section foreman, Thomas Hiley was instantly killed yesterday afternoon, a freight train passing over him. The engine driver saw Hiley lying on the track, but owing to the heavy grade did not succeed in stopping his train until the next station was reached. It is supposed that Hiley, while patrolling his section, fell on the icy track and was stunned. On the track was scattered \$62 in bills, Hiley having just drawn his pay.

Family's Very Narrow Escape.

By the Prospero we learn that Dr. Ledrew and his wife and child had a very narrow escape from death when their residence was destroyed by fire at Twillingate in the storm of last Saturday morning. The wind blew with hurricane force from the N.W. when at 3 a.m. the residence was discovered to be on fire by the watchman at W. Ashbourne's premises near. He aroused the inmates, who escaped by getting out through the windows in their night clothes and with bare feet, and they with the domestic took shelter in Mr. Young's residence. Both Dr. Ledrew and his wife received a terrible fright, and the latter, who is in a delicate state of health, was prostrated for a while. When the fire was discovered it was well under way, and the people of the place assembled with alacrity and only by their arduous work were the nearby residences, the outhouses of Dr. Ledrew's premises and the stores and residences of Messrs. Ashbourne and Young saved. They formed a bucket brigade, secured water from the harbor and kept the buildings drenched with water until all danger of their ignition was past. The handsome residence of Dr. Ledrew was completely wiped out, with all the furniture, clothing and other effects, while the doctor's surgical instruments, medicine, &c., were also consumed. The whole was worth \$7,000, and our informants say no insurance was carried on the property. When the family retired for the night some fire was left in the grate of the breakfast room, and it is believed that the cement of the fireplace became heated, and igniting the woodwork was the means of firing the house. Had the inmates been left a few minutes longer without warning all would have perished in the flames which enveloped the house as they left it.

BROKE HIS ANKLE.—Mr. Wil Crocker of Carter's Hill, while skating at the Paradise rink last evening fell on the ice and broke his ankle. A police officer who was there rendered first aid.

BOUGHT NEW SCHOONER.—Skipper Henry Stone, of Rocky Bay, T.B. returned from Gloucester, U.S.A., last week, having purchased a new schooner for the Labrador fishery, the Almeida, of 74 tons.

FOR POOR ASYLUM.—Mrs. Duran, an old woman, a native of Trinity arrived by the Prospero to-day to go to the Poor Asylum. Mr. Young arrived from Twillingate to go to hospital for treatment.

TEMPERATURE UP COUNTRY.—This morning at the Quarry the temperature was 10 below, and at Bishop's Falls, 10 above; Port aux Basques, 2 above; Bay of Islands, 2 below; Clarendville, 5 below.

RETURNED FROM H.R. GRACE.—Hon. J. D. Ryan, Councillor Mullaly, Mr. M. F. McCarthy and M. F. Duffy, who had been at Harbor Grace attending the funeral of the late Denis Shea, returned by train last night.

MAKING LONG VOYAGES.—The S. S. Pontopidan is to-day out from Glasgow 18 days with a load of coal for A. J. Harvey & Co. Some mariners in the city express anxiety as to the ship, but other hold that she is delayed by head gales and exceptionally strong weather.

A HARD TIME.—The s.s. Euphrates had a hard time taking the passengers for Bell Island aboard at Portugal Cove last evening owing to the high wind and frost. The work was accomplished after great difficulty. The past week has been a very trying one on the captain and crew.

Holmer's Remarkable Records.

A. G. George, the well known English runner, who of late years has been writing articles on sport, in a recent London letter says:—
The latest Powderhall Marathon race led to performances which are simply astounding. World's records from 16 miles to the end were created, and the doubts in some minds regarding the times accomplished by Ljungstrom, of Sweden, last March, have been set at rest.

The conditions for the race were very favorable, and with such a representative field, the experts were prepared for good performances. What happened, however, was far beyond anything expected, and it is quite evident the present day long distance professional cracks are better than any we have seen in the past.

The ability of E. Bouchard, of France, is well known in England, for he won the indoor Marathon race at the Agricultural Hall last March. He was strongly fancied on Tuesday, and when he started forcing tactics he soon commenced to draw away from all save one of his rivals, Hans Holmer, of Canada, was the exception, and he never let the Frenchman get more than 150 yards away. Bouchard passed the ten mile mark in 53 min. 16 secs., very fast considering the distance of the race. Soon after the half-way stage Holmer commenced to creep up on the leader, who put forth all his efforts to retain his advantage. It was a grand struggle, which culminated in Holmer passing his rival at 18 1/2 miles. Bouchard was now settled, and forced to walk a lap before finishing the twentieth mile, and subsequently he was passed by White and Gardiner.

Holmer slowed considerably once Bouchard was done with, and White joined on the leader. The Canadian had the race safe, however, and continued to break all records. Both White and Gardiner ran well, but were meeting better men in Holmer and Bouchard. The latter overdid the forcing business and had been content to run a waiting race he would have been close to the winner, though it is unlikely he would have defeated Holmer. London claims the winner as a native, but he crossed the Atlantic with his parents at an early age and settled in Canada. His eye-opening performance so soon after revisiting this side makes sportsmen anxious to see him perform again, and a match between Bouchard and the Canadian would certainly prove a draw. 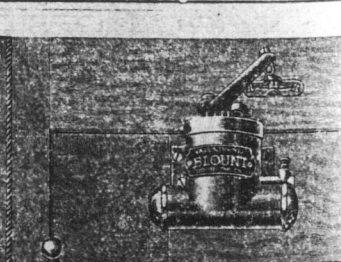
NEW ICE COMPANY.—A new company, known as the "Grand Bank Ice Co.," has been formed with headquarters at Cape Broyle.

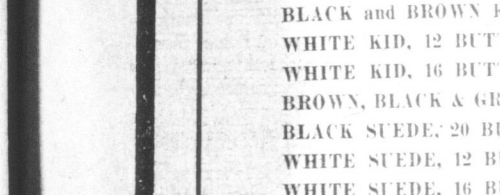
