He aroused the inmates, who escaped by getting out through the windows in their night clothes and with bare feet, and they with the domestic took shelter in Mr. Young's residence. Both Dr. Ledrew and his wife received a terrible fright, and the latter, who is in a delicate state of health, was prostrated for a while. When the fire was discovered it was well under way, and the people of the place assembled with alacrity and only by their arduous work were th nearby residences, the outhouses o Dr. Ledrew's premises and the stores and residences of Messrs. Ashbourn and Young saved. They formed bucket brigade, secured water from the harbor and kept the buildings drenched with water until all danger of their ignition was past. The hand some residence of Dr. Ledrew was completely wiped out, with all the furniture, clothing and other effects, while the doctor's surgical instru ments, medicine, &c., were also con sumed. The whole was worth \$7,000 was carried on the property. The latest Powderhall Marathon race led to performances which are simply astounding. World's records from 16 miles to the end were created. and the doubts in some minds regarding the times accomplished by Ljungstrom, of Sweden, last March, have been set at rest.

The conditions for the race were very favorable, and with such a representative field, the experts were prepared for good performances. What happened, however, was far beyond anything expected, and it is quite evident the present day long listance professional cracks are beter than any we have seen in the

The ability of E. Bouchard, France, is well known in England, for he won the indoor Marathon race the Agricultural Hall last March. He was strongly rancied on Tuesday, and Procker of Carter's Hill, while skat when he started forcing tactics he soon commenced to draw away from save one of his rivals. Hans Iolmer, of Canada, was the exception, and he never let the Frenchman get nore than 150 yards away. Fouchard passed the ten mile mark in 53 min. 16 secs., very fast considering the distance of the race. Soon after the half-way stage Holmer commenced to reep up on the leader, who put forth all his efforts to retain his advantage. it was a grand struggle, which cul-


