



At the City Hall

Mayor and full Board present at last evening's meeting.

A note was received from J. R. Goodridge saying that he would no longer let his field at Newtown Road to the Council as a dumping ground. Bishop & Sons asked for some of the Council's patronage in the supplying of hose to the City Council for the use of the Sanitary Department. They say they can supply it at a moderate price.

Some residents of Prescott Street who were reported by the Inspector to have allowed their taps to run all the winter will be ordered to conform to the regulations.

At the request of Councillor Channing 400 feet of fencing and 200 feet of hose will be supplied to Victoria Park.

An order will be placed for 5,000 feet of 6 inch water pipe for general use.

On motion of Councillor Mullaly, seconded by Councillor Channing, Messrs. Grace and Larkin were allowed \$35 each for extra services in paying employees the past season working at water cuts and snow shovelling.

A warm debate took place over the proposal of Councillor Ryan to have the salaries of Messrs. Fogarty and Farrell increased to \$50 and \$45 respectively. The Mayor said that "Estimates" would not permit doing so just now. Councillor Ryan thought that the increase might come from the estimates of the Water Department. Councillor Mullaly said that it amounted to the same thing, as the money all came from the same purse. If these men were to get the increase others would be seeking it, and the Council had decided yesterday that no increase would be granted. Councillor Myrick thought that both applicants were deserving of this increase. He believed that Councillor Mullaly opposed the resolution out of ill feeling towards an employee. After a stormy altercation between the last two speakers, Councillor Channing suggested that only Farrell's salary be increased, as he was an exceptionally competent official. On being put to the meeting this was lost by 2 to 2. Councillor Mullaly would not

vote. The Mayor expressed his disapproval of his conduct. The original proposition made by Councillor Ryan was then put to the meeting and carried, so that henceforth Mr. Fogarty will receive \$50 a month and Mr. Farrell \$45. Councillor Channing said that at the next meeting he would move to have this vote reconsidered.

Duff's rink roof will be tested by allowing the snow to remain on it for several days. If the snow don't come this winter the Council will wait till next winter. They feel quite confident it will come some time, and then the test will be "carried out" under the supervision of Architect McDonald and the Engineer, who will give the word when enough snow has fallen to make the test.

In the Engineer's report there was a valuable suggestion that a new set of regulations be drawn up in connection with the construction of public buildings. This will be considered.

After passing of pay rolls the meeting adjourned.

In the Board of Trade building yesterday afternoon Dr. J. S. Tait delivered a most interesting lecture to a large audience of pupil-teachers and others. There were in the gathering Hon. Jno. Harvey and W. W. Blackall. The "Atmosphere" was the subject of the discourse and the doctor gave it an admirable handling, dealing with the physical properties of the air, its chemical composition and the changes that occur to it in respiration. He emphasized the necessity for ventilation and dwell on the sources of impurity in the air, and gave other interesting information on the matter. This lecture is the first of a series of six which will be delivered later.
