Several of those who took part in the free-for-all fight which followed received black eyes and cut faces. The young man escaped with serious injury. The incident occurred while the regiment was returning from camp at Moose Jaw; Sask. Two American flags on the Main Street were set upon by a score of youths and the Stars and Stripes soon trampled into dirty rags. Then a man was rolled in mud. Im-Then a man was rolled in mud. Immediately afterward an American attempted to raise the flag on the to of a lamp post. It was torn down and a free fight ensued. Earlier in the day fifty Americans waving flags attempted to march up Main Street. Fearing a riot the police turned them back to the hotel where they had been

celebrating the Fourth of July. Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day. There still has been no formal de claration of war, although it is report ed the Bulgarian Minister to Greece has been recalled and has not yet departed for Athens. Premier Venizole announced to the Greek Parliament that Greek forces won a victory at Kilkish and captured sixty guns. This appears to have been secured by the amazing swiftness of the Greek advance from Saloniki, which, according to various correspondents, took the Bulgarians completely by surprise. The Servians claim a victorious advance to Kptchana, but the Servian invasion of Bulgaria has been repulsed. Bulgaria reported executing a turning movement which nullifies the Servians advance.

JOHANNESBURG,

South Africa, To-Day. Complete anarchy prevails here as a result of a strike which started a few days ago The authorities were obliged to order troops to fire on the rioters who applied the torch to the tar newspaper office, another large building in the centre of the town, as well as to the Bramfontein Station. Mob rioters attacked Werner Biet's headquarters, where the police fired upon them and compelled them to retreat. They soon renewed the attack, however, whereupon dragoons charged and disposed of them. Intermittent firing took place in several parts of the city, and up to midnight thirty persons had been taken to hospitals. Four civilians were killed and fifty wounded in a midnight wounded in a midnight control of the city.

wounded in a midnight riot connected with the miners' strike. The cavalry made repeated charges against mobs and wild confusion continued throughout the night with most streets darkness, the lamps having been destroyed by rioters. The situation which arose here last night was never equalled in the history of this country. The mob which seized the railway station at Johannesburg and the Bramfontein sidings a half mile away were unrestricted masters of the situation and had the railway officials at their mercy while troops and police

were engaged in other parts of the Rioters held up all the outgoing trains. When the police got the upper hand an attempt was made to dispatch the southern mails. This was a signal for a savage onslaught by the mob with sticks and stones. Police within the building overpowered them and in the meantime enormous crowds had sathered outside ous crowds had gathered outside Mounted troops charged them three times and the rioters retaliated with stones and bullets. By nine o'clock the situation was extremely grave; Park Station was in flames and in-Park Station was in flames and incendiaries were setting fire to other large buildings. The Star building was ignited from front and rear and soon also was a mass of flames, mounted forces galloped up but found it impossible to take control; they were jeered when they called on rioters to stop their disorders. At first troops and police refrained from using their firearms but later fired over heads of the rioters; re-inforcements of dragoous by continued charges finally scattered the rioters,


