



London Daily Express.—Germany has had enough of the war. She will fight on desperately and determinedly if she is forced to fight, and she will not be beaten without many more months of fearful struggle and endurince. Her successes have been considerable, but she fears her power to hold on to them. The German General Staff knows that she has passed the zenith of her strength, and that neither Great Britain nor Russia have reached theirs. Germany never neglects anything that might make to her advantage. Peace now would necessarily leave her some of the spoils, and would enable her to prepare for another attempt to plant her jackboots on Europe. Peace now would, therefore, be a betrayal of the cause of freedom and democracy, and would make all the suffering and sacrifice of the last twelve months absolutely useless.
