Mr. Lacey Answers "Veritas."

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I quite admit the logic of Veritas in to-day's News, and consider there is a good deal in it, looking at it from that decided viewpoint, but as Veritas is himself wrong in some of his statements, it is quite possible that he may also be wrong in this. To begin with, Father Nangle is not with "Ours" in France, but is with the 33rd Division, 101st Field Ambulance, and as will be quite understood, can only be with "Ours" during whatever spare time he has from his own busy regiment, which alone evidences the burning desire he has to be attached to "Ours," and which latter fact justifies that portion of my letter advocating same.

The writer never supposed or implied that Father Nangle would "desert a dying soldier to chronicle some occurrence," and it isn't necessary to claim friendship or schoolmateship with him, to bring out that fact about Father Nangle or any other Catholic priest, and Veritas' assertion on this point makes him the laughing-stock of most of his readers. Nor is it invidiously able to hold ITS OWN LINE and THAT OF SOME ENGLISH REGIMENTS AS WELL.

I, too, lay claim to the privileges of friendship, and even intimacy, with Fr. Nangle, and will venture the opinion that nothing would please him more than his appointment to "Ours" as Chaplain—his greatest wish on earth—and this in itself would give him the means and the time to contribute himself a correspondent. It need be. Anyway, the Telegram never advocated a WAR correspondent, but that there should be some official CHRONICLER of the doings of "Ours," and it wouldn't be necessary to be in half a dozen different places at one time to accomplish this. The "front" of the Nfld. Regiment is not yet extended that far, although it is admittedly able to hold ITS OWN LINE and THAT OF SOME ENGLISH REGIMENTS AS WELL.

If Veritas should write over his own well-known initials or name I will enumerate many reasons why ANY clergyman would be more suitable than any layman, be he civilian or soldier, but I shall not again refer to an anonymous letter. I happen to know Veritas, in fact, the writer, and proclaim the man, no matter how he signs his contributions, and his manner of referring to me somewhat surprises me, as I know him to be a "man of letters." I didn't sign my letter as "Mr. L." or as "Lacey," or as "Correspondent Lacey" and Veritas should not so far forget the ethics of the profession as to use these cognomens in replying.

Then, again, he surprises everyone when he says: "A War correspondent should not be BURDENED with the sacerdotal duties of Priest." Rather should he say: "A Priest should not be burdened with the duties of WAR correspondent," nor do we want to burden Fr. Nangle with such duties. That might be safely left to the Hearst gang or their Nfld. Agents. But we do want the doings of our OWN brave lads to be recorded and preserved, not for to-day's newspapers but for our children's children, and for the well-merited honor and glory of this down-trodden, neglected Newfoundland.
