Fish cannot be preserved by pickposition, but cannot restore the deteriorated flesh of the fish to its primary soundness. This same truth applies to the refrigeration, a putrid fish or carcass of meat can be frozen and further decomposition be held steeped in a solution made up of salt and their own liquid. The fish thus pickled when air dried if stored in a warm humid atmosphere soon develop a humus or kind of fungus growth locally called "dun" fish which eventually covers the whole surface, and rapidly all the other fish in

As dry salted fish rarely is affected with "dun," the deduction is that fish steeped in its own liquid develops a condition that induces this affection, hence do not try to preserve

fection, hence do not try to preserve fish by pickling.

I have been informed that at a Board of Trade meeting, held for the purpose of dealing with this fish question, that reference was made to the food taken by the codfish at certain seasons causing the flesh of the fish to turn pink. The food referred to is known by the fishermen generally as "blackberries." It appears in profuse quantities on the coast of Labrador and parts of the Newfoundland coast in August and September. When the fish becomes glutted with this food few fishermen care to eat them. The flesh of the fish seems to become permeated with the "flavour" become permeated with the "flavour" of the food it has eaten and that flavour is second only to the odour of the blackberry food, compared with which Assafetida would be high grade toilet perfume. There is a "pinkeye" spot in each of those so called blackberries but I do not think that digested as a food it has anything to do with colouring the flesh of the fish; in fact I know it has not, but I also know that this food when vomited from the fish will stain the gangboards of the boat pink, and that a part of the alimentary often left adhering to the anus by a poor "header," has caused a deep pink mark on that part of the fish where it lay after salting. Only when the fish are feeding on the so-called blackberry food will the excrement from the broken portion of the intestine redden the fish. I have examined many cases but never knew reddening to occur when fish were feeding on caplin, squid, etc. Codfish when caught vomit this food in large quantities, the stench from which is unbearable, and there is no doubt should any fish go to salt bulk with any of those blackberries attached to it, that every such fish would turn out the pink of imperfection. The writer, when fishing on Labrador has seen the water literally thick with this jelly-like food. At no time in the fishing season is there required more care and cleanliness in handling codfish than that time when it is become permeated with the "flavour" of the food it has eaten and that fla-
