Former Supporters No Longer With Squires

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Like many other voters in St. John's West, I supported the Squires Party last Fall for the purpose of bringing about a change in the Government, with the hope of giving them a chance, at any rate, to see if they do better than the party which then had the reins of power. We backed Mr. Squires with the honest, innocent belief that he would be a Premier in reality and that the most harm Coaker could do, would be only a few trifling whimsicalities that nobody would notice. Also we must openly confess that our judgment went completely astray, for the very opposite has happened. Coaker before he was a week in power, put Squires to the mat, as the sports would say, and has kept him "groggy" ever since; so much so that Squires is completely in his grip and unable to assert his strength. Instead of a free Government made up of men who would sit around a Council Board and come to mutual understandings, agreeable to each and every section of the country, we are pained now to witness a complete and arrogant Coaker dictatorship, the most repugnant state of affairs, one most degrading and most intolerant, that any country should suffer. What fools we mortals were, to be sure, to allow ourselves to be carried off our feet with this "time for a change" nonsensical cry, but it is a great blessing indeed that we can redeem our folly so soon, and undo to some extent, if not completely, the harm we created. Personally, I have no objection to Mr. Squires or Mr. Brownrigg, and would sustain them again if they were entirely rid of the Coaker nuisance, but I regret to be obliged to turn them down in the bye-election. Like my other friends, personally we have nothing against them, but we have to sink the personal aspect now and consider first the grave and horrible danger of Coaker rule. Until this menace is removed, I would advise Messrs. Squires and Brownrigg to stand aside for the sake of St. John's. It is too terrible and serious for any citizen who regards conscientiously what is now his manifest duty, to mark his ballot for any further toleration of Win. F. Coaker. No man with a conscience that recognizes rightful duty before a great injurious wrong, could mark a ballot for Messrs. Squires and Brownrigg in St. John's West under the present circumstances; but much as I regret to part with these gentlemen, myself, and those who do so for the same reason, will have easy minds in knowing that we only do the right and proper thing by those whom in honor bound we must first of all protect, that is the families of all the bread-winners in St. John's. Poor Houses must not give place to prosperity.
