

Why Americans hate Farming.

I think no one can read the splendid prose poem, G. Pyot's Earth and Man, wherein he characterises the position and products of the American continents, without feeling that they ought to be the food producers of the world. They are the seat, he says, of excessive vegetable, as the continents of the Eastern Hemisphere are of the noblest animal development. Let us, then, rather set to carry out the grand design of Nature than to go against it. I am tired of the stories about Western farmers burning their corn. Let the dry-goods clerks be set to work on the railroads and canals to bring it to the seaboard, then. With butter at sixty cents and beefsteak at forty cents a pound, and flour at eighteen dollars a barrel, as they are at this present writing (May, 1868), it is absurd to say that we are producing enough for home consumptiod and for exportation too. Many and many a poor family have given up butter and sugar and juicy meat within these last eight years. The fact that a paper dollar is but two-thirds of a gold dollar cannot account for provisions being two or three times their former price. No, the real trouble is that the American hates farming and loves trading, partly because he is physically undeveloped, and therefore physically lazy; partly because the simulus of human companionship to which his childhood at the distriet school accustoms him; partly because at school, he got no knowledge nor love of nature, but only the trading ideas instilled by six years drill in the dollar and cent examples of the arithmetic and last though not least, because farming kills his wife, takes all the bloom, flesh and vitality away from her at forty. Very often, even if she can afford one, she cannot get a servant; so that she is in truth, next to an Indian squaw, the greatest drudge on the American continent.—Atlantic Monthly for January.

Jeondon, Jan. 21.—Advices from Madferia to the 14th, give no mention of the whereabouts of the thirty-nine missing passengers and crew of the Hibernia, who were said to have landed there. The story of their being picked up is now believed to be unfounded.

The amount of bullion in the bank of England has increased £99,000 stg. since the last report last Thurday.

London, Jan. 21.—Late advices from Aukland, New Zealand, report that a frightful massacre of the whites by the natives, had occurred at Poverty Bay on that Island.

Paris, Jan. 21.—Mr. Burlingame and the two chief Mandarins of the Chinese Embassy, made their first visit to the Minister of Foreign Affairs yesterday, accompanied by the Secretary of the Legion. The interview was highly satisfactory, and promises a successful result for the Mission. The Marquis informed the ambassadors that the Emperor would be pleased to accord them an audience on Saturday noxt, at the palace of the Tulleries.

It is officially stated that the Conference awaits the reply of the Greek Government to the resoultion which has been adopted. When that is received, the Conference will dissolve.

### American Despatches

San Francisco, Jan. 21.—Mexican advices state that, in the State of Oaxaca, a formidable revolution was brewing against the Government of Juarez.

Advices from China state that the Yung Chow affair has been settled satisfactorily. A proclamation has been issued by the Chinese Government, setting forth that a treaty with England requires that religious establishments and missionaries shall not be annoyed nor foreign travellers be treated with disrespect. The mining operations in Chafoo have proved successful, and some valuable mines have been discovered. Havana, Jan. 21.—Advices from Hayti state that a battle had taken place, in which the revolutionists were victorious. They appear to have gained ground everywhere in Hayti. New York, Jan. 22.—The steamship Kangaroo, from Liverpool, has arrived.
