THE INDECENT ASSAULT CASE. Thomas Hoban was brought up this morning and charged with committing an indecent assault, with intent, on a woman named Watling, in a lane off Mac-donnell street on Thursday night. From the appearance of the woman's face, she must have been brutally used. Her eyes and checks are all black and swelled, altogether disfiguring the features. It appears from her e idence that on Thursday evening shortly after 6 o'clock she left the Great Western Hotel to go to Ward's Hotel, She was followed by prisoner and six or seven others. Prisoner assisted by some of the other men forced her into the lane adjoining the premises of Mr. James Armstrong. They there threw her down; some of them put

now on her mouth to prevent her cries being heard; one of the men palled up her clothes and attempted to violate her person. One perished on the seaffold. Another attempted to muzzle the freedom of the Press and produced the Three Days of July, 1830. The last, after eighteen years of a quasi constitutional reign, fell in the effort to prevent an extension of the suffrage and to suppress the right of public meeting. # A SITCH IN THE PROCEEDINGS ! Rumored Withdrawal of Chief Justica Cockburn.

Lendon, Feb. 2.—The discussion of the Malbana chains continues and grows more veherical as the opening of Parliament approaches. The English case haid before the General Board of Arbitration, has not been published, and no opportunity has been given of forming an estimate of British demands; but the case of the United States has now been before the public two or three week, and all the newspapers and other organs of public opinion teem with hostile comment and false reports in regard to it.

The Advertiser asserts that Chief Justice Cockburn, one of the arbitrators, will withdraw from the board, and that the Government will repudiate the Treaty of Washington.
