Council met on Monday 28th inst.

Guthrie, Esq. relating to the drafting of a by-law for the division amongst the several School sections of the interest derived from moneys invested for Educational purposes, which was referred to a committee composed of the Reeve, Deputy-Reeve, and Mr. Sweetnam, to confer with the Solicitor relating to the appropriation of said moneys. Messrs. Gaites & Keunedy presented an account of \$213 50, for tumplising and gravelling portions of roads, which was ordered to be paid. Mr. Darby introduced by-law No. 78, for the purpose of assessing and levying rates on the several School sections, for Common School purposes, in accordance with the applications presented from the Boards of Trustees at last meeting of Council. The amounts applied for, and the rates required to be levied, on the several sections, are as follows:—No.1, \$800, five mills and five-tenths in the dollar; No. 2, \$350, one mill and five-tenths in the dollar; No. 2, \$350, which was passed after going through the required readings.
